TO WORK IN NOVA SCOTIA.—Mr. Morrissey, contractor, who has been here looking for workmen for the mines in Nova Scotia left yesterday for Hopewell, N. S., taking one hundred men with him.

EMBARGO LIFTED.—The British authorities have removed the embargo on the importation of apples and a shipment is going forward from Nova Scotia. Ocean rates are \$5 a barrel and \$2 a box.

NAVAL PATROL DISBANDING.—The naval patrol which has been stationed at Louisburg, N. S., has been ordered to Halifax, where the crews will be disbanded. Mine fields along the southern coast have been swept up and other war-time harbor protections removed.

SHIPBUILDING IN NOVA SCOTIA.—It is announced that two large steamers each 280 feet in length will be built at the Scotia Shipyards New Glasgow, N. S., to the order of the government. The arrangements were completed this week and the keels will be laid at an early date. The steamship to be launched next week will carry the name "Watuika." It is a Micmac name and in keeping with the names that the Scotia Company have given their ships, as Woban, Wasis, Wagsama, etc. The meaning of "Watuika" is "white man's canoe" which would seem to be a somewhat appropriate name for a steamship. Woban was Micmac for "day break" and it is said was not entirely a Micmac word, but had different meanings in some other languages. The "Watuika" is to be used by the Scotia Company on their own trade.

NEWS FROM TIBET.—The announcement of the birth of a eleven-pound girl to Mr. and Mrs. R. A. MacLeod of Flora, Tibet, has been received and will be of much interest here as Mr. MacLeod is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Duncan MacLeod, Hartsville, P. E. I. Mr. MacLeod says "she sleeps during the day and does her fussing at night. She very effectively commands her "daddy." Her lightest whisper moves him more than all the ranged reasoning in the world." He writes about the general conditions in Tibet, as follows:—"Conditions are better here at present. Fighting has been suspended and peace plans are under way. A good deal of robbing is going on in the vicinity of Batang. The last mail we got was dated May 11 and there was very little of that. He asks for some sugar beet seed. His letter was dated August 17, 1918. It was received here November 20, 1918.

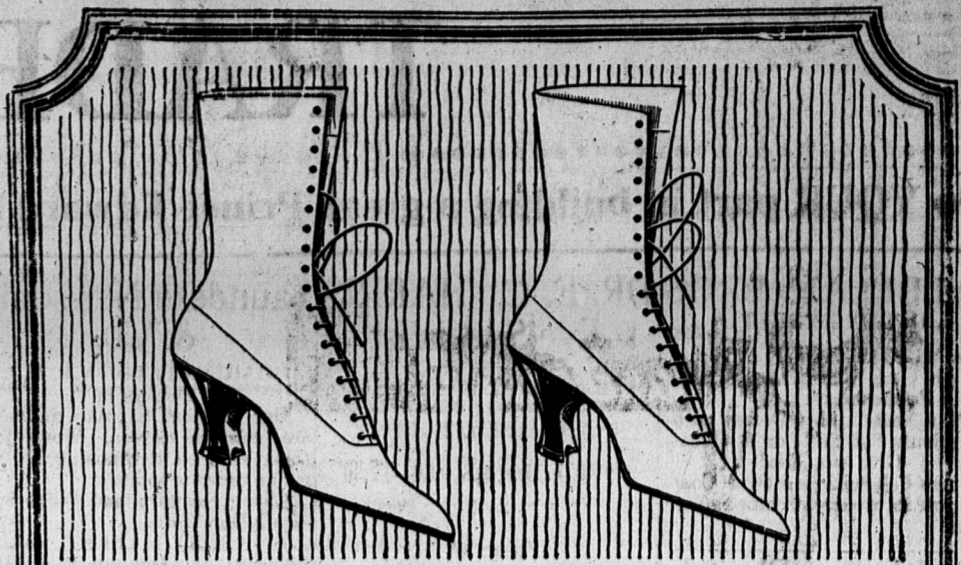
