Escaped Nazi Prisoners May Be In Hiding Here; Police Seek Cooperation

The cooperation of the people of Prince Edward Island is requested by the Royal Canadian Mounted Police in a nation-wide search which is being conducted for four escaped German prisoners of war. The prisoners escaped from an internment camp at Blenheim, Ontario, on July 27, and may have gone into hiding in some rural part of the country. Only one of them is believed to speak any English; but this may not be the case, as prisoners have been known to conceal their knowledge of other languages but their own.

Following is a description of the four escapees, as supplied by the R.C.M.P.:

Walter Manhardt, 27 years, age, 5 ft. 7 ins., 174 lbs. Sallow complexion, brown eyes, dark brown hair. Straight nose, prominent pointed chin, normal teeth, medium mouth. Powerful build. A Roman Catholic. He has a small mole at bottom of his throat. He speaks German, some English, and has a peculiar husky voice. He was an Oberleutnant of the German Air Force.

Friedrich W. Patrik, 24 years, 5 ft. 9 ins., 180 lbs., ruddy complexion, hazel eyes with puffed lids. His hair is straight and light brown. Ears are prominent. His nose has a slight hook, long, round chin, good teeth, a full lower lip. He speaks German only, has

a scar on the left eyebrow, scar on left cheek, scar on back of left hand, and one on left forefinger. He has a large bone bump at the rear of his right ear. He was formerly a seaman in the German Merchant Navy.

Hans J.A. Eultgen, 29 years, 5 ft. 10 ins., 132 lbs., fresh complexion, brown-blue eyes. Hair is brown, wavy, and parted on left side. His nose is straight and long. He has a small chin with cleft in the centre. Good teeth, normal mouth. He has a scar from left eyebrow on forehead, scar on base of right hand on outside, large scar mark on base of right calf. He is a former seaman of the German Merchant Navy.

Helmut F. Hack, 25 years, 5 ft. 7 ins., 145 lbs., fresh complexion, blue eyes, wavy fair hair, parted on the left side, small nose with a slight tilt to the end, a full round chin, good teeth, and a straight thin mouth. He has a mole on the left side of the bridge of his nose. He speaks German only, and was formerly a seaman of the German Merchant Navy.

Prince Edward Island citizens are requested to be on the watch for any one or more persons answering these descriptions. They have information they are asked to get in touch immediately with the nearest R.C.M.P. detachment, or Army Provost.

after the post-victory occupation period. This development is understood to be designed to match a similar eastern alliance which would be formed around Soviet Russia with both combined so constituted that they would be able to function within the framework of any future world security league.

"No one can doubt," he said, "that when time and opportunity presents these men will give as suitable an account of themselves against the hated Nazis in the field as they have already given in the bitter and bloody warfare in France itself."

The foreign secretary made no attempt to minimize the difficulties which confront France. He told the House that 2,500,000 of her men - prisoners of war, political detainees, and forced laborers - are still held in Germany.

LONDON, Nov. 14 - (CP Cable) - A young Canadian bombardier, F.O. Walker, of the Royal Canadian Air Force, was killed in the raid on the German battleship Tirpitz in Norway's fjord, Nov. 12.

LONDON, Nov. 14 - (CP) - Ship of the British fleet destroyed nine German vessels Sunday night off Lister Fjord, south of the Norwegian coast, and drove a 10th ashore, the British navy announced tonight.

Two cruisers and four destroyers, including the Canadian destroyer Algonquin, composed the British force and all returned to port safely "having suffered a small number of casualties," the admiralty said.

Blind Man Helped To Sink The Tirpitz NEW YORK, Nov. 14 - (AP) - The sinking of the Tirpitz by R.A.F. Lancasters using six-ton earthquake bombs is a triumph for a blind man who lost his sight by a German bomb blast in the attacks on London in 1940, the British Information services said last night.
