Rev. Clarence E. Eberman and Mrs. Eberman arrived by the boat from Picton last night but because of a mistake on the part of the Maritime President not being acquainted with the time of arrival of boat no time was allowed for the Charlottetown meeting, therefore the meetings announced to be held in Zion Church this afternoon and evening are cancelled. Mr. Eberman goes to Summerside by the early train this morning.

It is understood that in consequence of the cruelty to a horse hired from a livery in the City on Sunday last, a society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals will be formed. There is doubtless a work for such a society in the punishment of those disposed to inflict suffering indifferently to worth. The Stipendiary's condemnation of the actions of the defendant yesterday morning in the police court was well-grounded when it is considered that in addition to the suffering, caused by the whip he secured a piece of board in which was a nail and with it he punctured the skin of the animal until blood flowed freely. It is to be hoped the society if formed will do much to prevent such cruelty.

At a meeting of the Canadian Rifle League held in the office of McDonald & Stewart last evening it was agreed that the trophy won by the Ch'town team of 1900 be awarded to the member making the highest aggregate points in the regular matches at the annual prize meeting of the Queen's Co. Rifle Association to be held on Kensington Rifle Range on Wednesday next the 25th inst., conditions of the match governed by the D. R. A. rules of 1900. At a subsequent meeting of the Q. C. R. A. the above resolution was approved and in accordance with the above adopted and embodied as a part of their program in the competitions as above.

A LARGE meeting of the South African Contingent was held in the Stipendiary Magistrate's court room last night to take into consideration the question of the members going to St. John to receive their medals with their comrades of G. Company. The committee appointed at the last meeting to ascertain from the Dept. of Militia and Defense, Ottawa, the possibilities of receiving transportation from Charlottetown to St. John so as to enable them to be present on the occasion of the presentation of medals by his Royal Highness the Duke of Cornwall and York reported that the department had refused the application as there was no funds at the disposal of the department for such a contingency. After considerable discussion it was ascertained that about 30 members were desirous of going to St. John. And quite a number intimated their willingness to pay their own expenses sooner than lose the opportunity of being present to receive personally their medals. Several members not being in a position to pay their own expenses it was suggested by some friends present that they appeal to the generosity of the citizens to assist them in providing a fund for the purpose.

At the police court yesterday morning Prof. St. C. Omer, the boatblack, charged with disorderly driving and ill-using his horse was before the court. Several witnesses were examined all of whom testified to the ill treatment of the horse and fast driving on the streets. His Honor before fining the defendant stated that according to the evidence Omer was taking charge of the city. For fast driving he imposed a fine of \$10. The ill-treating of the horse, His Honor said was nauseating to listen to. He had never heard or knew of anything like it. The assault upon a dumb animal which was doing its best was inhuman and the treatment received by the horse from its master was apparently without provocation and was certainly unmerciful. He would therefore impose a fine of \$25 and costs or two months' imprisonment. He only wished the defendant was present in court. Four boys named respectively Henry Brown, Edward Byers, Francis Connolly and Brenton Essory were before the court on complaint of Patrick Murray who testified they were annoying him in his house at an early hour in the morning. All of the boys were fined \$2 with the exception of Edward Byers. George Goldie for drunkenness was fined \$2 or 10 days. His Honor made the fine light as it was Goldie's first appearance and his promise that there would not be a recurrence.
