ROTARY MEETING.—At the monthly meeting of the Rotary Club Thursday night, the feature of the programme was the admirable "Rotary Message" given by District Governor Walter Grant, who declared that Rotary means the development and scientific of acquaintance, fellowship and friendship. The work of the Business Methods Committee in developing ethical standards in business was also stressed by the District Governor, whose address was highly commended in eloquent terms by the Chairman of the Rotarian Dr. W. Rotarian W. M. Lowe was appointed delegate to attend the International Rotary Convention at St. Louis during the summer.

Brilliant Career of Island Pastor.—The following reference to Rev. J. A. Ford, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Dayton, Wash., one of the oldest churches in the State, will be of special interest here as Mr. Ford was born in Bothwell, P. E. I., and has still many friends in New Perth, St. Peter's, East Point. He was educated in P. W. College, is a graduate of Acadia, got his Masters degree from Colby University and has been a preacher, pastor, editor and lecturer for over thirty years. Mrs. Ford is also well known here, being a niece of Dr. Silas McVane who died in Rome some years ago and a sister of Mr. Ezra Frazer of North Lake, P. E. I.

Mr. Ford recently delivered a lecture on the Land of the Heather or Scotland in Peace or War that attracted a good deal of public attention and the following clipping from the Dayton Despatch gives the popular view.

During all the years of the Dayton Baptist church, it is safe to say there has never been a program offered the public so excellent as that which was given by the Priscilla Club, last Thursday evening.

The lecture by the pastor, Rev. J. A. Ford on "The Land of the Heather" or "Scotland in Peace and War" was a master-plead and bonneted figure of the speaker appeared on the platform with the close of the hour he was master of the situation and held his audience spellbound.

To say the lecture was highly instructive would be stating a fact. It had the rare quality of gripping the hearers by the very force of its logic and by its array of illuminating facts. In the hearts of those who heard the lecture the Scot will have a large place because of his achievements in history.

Mr. Ford dealt with the Scot from a military, scientific, literary and religious point of view and showed that, in many cases, though living under a foreign flag, in all those fields of endeavor, the Scot had a prominent place.

It is not however, the purpose of this article to give a digest of the lecture but to simply state that we believe we have a man among us whose ability to interest and entertain is seldom excelled on any of our Chautauque platforms.

To this end we should be ready to do what we can in the way of publicity in the hope that Mr. Ford can be prevailed upon to give us another lecture and entertainment in the near future.

Mr. Ford has been invited to deliver the lecture before the Catholic Club of Spokane on April 27th also before the Society at Pendleton, Oregon. Mr. Ford who will supply the First Baptist Church in Spokane on April 29th, has published many articles on Rambles through Phenomenal Scenes, The Land of Evangelists, The man and the Church, The Universal Christ, Is Evolution Scientific? Vital Forces of Democracy, etc.

JOHN T. McLEOD
AN APPRECIATION.

I crave the kind indulgence of the Guardian for a few lines to the memory of John T. McLeod, whose recent passing out was noted in your issue of the 22nd inst.

My earliest recollection of Mr. McLeod goes back to about sixty years ago when he (doughed on my father's Johnston Road farm and permitted me to walk in front of him between the plow handles, holding on by the cross bar. I was then about seven years of age and enjoyed the horse back rides with him back and forth from and to the fields.

I afterwards knew the deceased as a threshing mill operator and frequently "cut hands" for him. His kindly demeanor seemed to rule the situation wherever he went. When a belt broke or a horse slipped on the tread mill, Mr. McLeod acted quickly, coolly and competently.

Some years later when the 12th of July Celebration was held in Andrew Dohler's big field at the foot of Ten Mile Hill, some hungry boys approached Mr. McLeod, who was superintending, one of the tables in an effort to buy from him some bread and butter with their few "pennies". He smiled sympathetically and bade them help themselves and keep the coppers. The writer was one of the hungry boys.
