And suppose they were never taught how to judge values - how to pick and choose for themselves from all the thousands of products that can be advertised and sold in a free market.

Would they be fit to care for themselves and help run the country then - just because they were old enough to vote?

Even grown-ups would soon be pretty helpless if that happened... as helpless as the people in Germany or Italy or Japan, where the papers can tell only one side of the story. "Self-government by a free people" would be just a pretty phrase in the history books.

"BOSH," some people say, "there isn't any danger of that happening here! We have a free press!" So we have. And be thankful for it. There won't be any danger so long as we are vigilant to keep it free.

AND IT'S SO EASY TO NIP THAT DANGER IN THE BUD!

To begin with, don't say, "I'll let the other fellow worry about that one!" This is every citizen's worry. The publisher needs your help... because there could even be restrictions against our telling you about restrictions! So start to read your newspaper more carefully. Keep an eye open for any non-military story that seems "doctored" at the source - for significant news you know of that doesn't appear at all. Tell your neighbours! Write the editor!

Free newspapers want your criticism as well as your praise. That's what keeps them free!

Montreal Exchange

MONTREAL, Aug. 11 (CP) - The trend was generally downward on the stock exchange today though a few issues pushed ahead. Heavier losses were in mines, steels and utilities. Consolidated Smelters lost 1-2. Saguenay Power dropped a point and Montreal Power and B. C. Power "A" were also lagged. Shawinigan rallied after a weak opening. Car common recovered a fractional slip and Dominion Tar, Enamel and Heating and International Bronze Powders were supported into higher ground. Bathurst was weaker, and Canadian Steamships preferred fell back. C.P.R. advanced a fraction. A number of miscellaneous leaders moved back, including National Breweries and Lake of the Woods Distillers-Sagaram preferred dropped five points in one of its rare appearances. Total sales: 20,500 shares; Industrial, 6,000; Mines, 13,900.

CURRENCIES

NEW YORK, Aug. 11 (CP) - The Canadian dollar lost 1-8 of a cent in relation to the United States dollar, closing at a discount of 1 1/8 per cent today in foreign exchange trading. Ottawa Foreign Exchange Control Board rate 9.09 - 9.91 per cent discount. The pound Sterling advanced 1-4 cent to \$4.03 3/4. The Argentine free peso rose 5/8 to a new 1941 high at 23.90 cents. Far Eastern currencies lost, the Shanghai dollar declining 3/8 of a cent to a new 1941 low of five cents and the Hong Kong dollar closing 1/8 cent lower to 25.37 cents.

Toronto Exchange

TORONTO, Aug. 11 (CP) - Weakness predominated on the Toronto exchange today and all four indices closed down, the base metal shares leading the decline with a loss of .65, trailed by the industrial with a drop of .35. Only 123,000 shares changed hands. Smelters declined 1-4 and losses of 2 to 5 cents were noted by White-Amulet, Bend Oreille, Sherritt and Steel Rock and Alderme lost a cent. Minor gains were noted by Falconbridge and Nickel. O'Brien closed up a cent. Minor gains were noted also by Pio-ver, Preston, Wright-Hargreaves, Bon-etaj and Delnite against moderate losses for Central Patricia, Chester-ville, Mining Corporation, Perron and Sylvanite. Sigma closed 3/8 cent down and Dome weakened 1-2. Utility, senior oil and paper stocks chiefly accounted for the index loss of 3/8 in the industrial.
