Case of "Rose Marie"

Bandits Cave Study For Geologists

ROCHEPORT, Mo., Oct. 23. — Rendezvous for student outings and a subject of study for geological field trips from the University of Missouri the Rocheport cave, near here, once was the den of river bandits and the haven for escaping horse thieves.

The cavern, a deep recess in the rolling hills of central Missouri, is not far from the Missouri river which skirts Rocheport. The entrance, about 50 feet high, and half that wide is screened by heavy underbrush, that in summer almost completely conceals the opening.

In the criminal days when Rocheport was one of the most important river points between St. Louis and Kansas City, folk lore records the operations of a band of river pirates who regularly stripped the wharves of barrels of sorghum, boxes of provisions and other commodities. The loot was stored in the cave. A fight between the river robbers and a posse of enraged boatmen at the mouth of the cave is said to have ended the career of that band, and he lives of several of its members.

Horse thieves in later years would hide in the cave when the vigilantes pressed them too closely. It has many chambers and winding tunnels.

Queen Marie to Visit Montreal

MONTREAL, Oct. 23. — Queen Marie of Rumania and those accompanying her in the drive around the city of Montreal will be permitted to enter Mount Royal Park in automobiles, which is contrary to municipal regulations. Her Majesty, Prince Nicholas and Princess Ileana will arrive here on Wednesday morning.

"If there is any objection," said Mayor Martin yesterday at the meeting of the General Reception Committee, "the fine will be \$10.00.

By motoring directly to the mountain top, the royal visitors will weather permitting obtain one of the most picturesque panoramic views on the continent.

Immediately on her arrival here the queen and her party will be tendered a reception and later taken on a tour of the city. Visits will also be made to McGill University and the University of Montreal, in the afternoon.

As Queen Marie is coming to Montreal unofficially, no guard of honor will be provided by the federal authorities.

MALE MANNEQUINS PARADE IN LONDON

LONDON, Oct. 25. — Male mannequins paraded this afternoon before purchasers of men's clothes in a tailoring establishment on Regent Street, Messrs. Dickins and Jones.

"They are paid at the same rate as girls for the same amount of work," said a representative of the firm, when asked about the innovation. "Presumably these boys intend taking the job seriously already they have had great success in showing off the newest models of motoring costumes. It is a job that should appeal to stage chorus boys as a side line, since they are trained in the art of wearing all sorts of clothes and walking well."

Signs Of Old Armada

Several years ago a man by the name of A. H. Muelly of Corpus Christi, claimed to have stumbled onto the remnant of one of the Spanish vessels. Unable to finance salvaging operations, Muelly made an attempt, it is said, to find some record of a vessel having been sunk at the spot where he found the flotam, but discovered nothing authentic to connect his find with the famed treasure fleet.

Within a stone's throw of the proposed ocean drive, the wreckage of the supposed treasure fleet still lies, according to tradition, but it is hidden by the waves that have voided countless other attempts of 15th and 16th century pirates to transfer the wealth of the New World to a crumbling Spain.

New System of Handling Baggage

MONCTON, N. B., Oct. 23. — Effective Nov. 1st a new system covering "Collect delivery system" of baggage from railroad stations throughout the Dominion will go into effect on the Canadian National Railway. The purpose of the new system is to facilitate the handling of baggage for passengers on the railways when the new system goes into effect baggage may be checked from any point on the Canadian National Railways to any destination in the United States of Canada and will be delivered to the address specified without further action on the part of the traveller.

A passenger on purchasing his ticket at Winnipeg, Moncton or any other point on the system and desiring to have his baggage delivered to his home or to his business address will on checking his baggage give the desired address and may thereafter rid himself of any care and worry regarding the arrival of baggage at the proper destination. The delivery charge will be collected from the owner when delivery is made by the delivery transfer company. This will be the usual charge varying in different cities and depending upon the distance handed or hauled.

REVAL, Estonia, Oct. 25. — Cosmetics are contraband in Estonia. Nevertheless, Estonian women manage to give their complexions the latest Paris tint, and there is apparently no lack of lipstick. Estonian women also manage to get perfumes, toilet waters and hair tonics which are suggestive of France.

Marie Lohr possesses a well-trained voice, Lily Brayton can sing almost as well as she can act, and Celia Cavendish sings as well as her mother, Isabel Jay did, when leading in musical comedy.

Plans Ocean Highway Along Spanish Trail

ARANSAS PASS, Texas, Oct. 25. — Swashbuckling gentlemen, whose business instincts led them to settle when Spain was in her glory, have supplied Col. Sam Robertson of Brownsville, Texas, with a romantic background for an ambitious adventure.

Colonel Robertson is building an ocean driveway along the low lying islands off the coast of Texas. These strips of land stretch for hundreds of miles up the coast from Brownsville and lie within sight of shore.

Drive On Island Beaches

The proposed ocean driveway will be the longest in the world, and when it is completed, motorists may drive from Brownsville to Corpus Christi, Texas, over the island beaches.

Pirates of the Spanish main have cast their glances over this stretch of sand. More than 400 years ago, tradition says, a fleet of galleons, laden with the pirated treasures of the Montezumas, set sail from the New World for old Spain.

Scene Of Buried Treasure

A tropical disturbance cast the famed armada about, drove it out of its course for days, and finally wrecked the fleet on the Texas coast, a five days march north of the Rio Grande. More than 300 survivors are said to have escaped by making their way overland to the Panuco river, now the shipping outlet for the Mexican oil fields near Tampico.

This treasure is supposed to have been buried somewhere along the course over which the pleasure caravans of modern America soon are to travel. Occasionally coins have been picked up in one of the sandy hills near the shore, and much sporadic searching has been done.
