CONDEMN MILLIONS OF ROUNDS.

QUEBEC, July 4.—A complete re-organization of the staff, and an overhauling of the institution generally, are anticipated as a result of the report on the Dominion Arsenal here by a Commission which recently finished its labors and whose findings are under consideration by the militia authorities at Ottawa.

There is reason to believe that twelve million rounds of ammunition have been condemned and when it is stated that the cost is figured between \$25 and \$26 per thousand, the item of loss will be recognized as a material one. However, the cartridges are not wholly bad, and it is possible to save a very considerable part of the immense supply which has been found effective. This will be done by making them over.

CONDITION OF AFFAIRS.

Lack of supervision and inspection are carelessness on the part of the employees are the main causes of the trouble which has developed. The Arsenal authorities both made and inspected the output of their institution. Some time ago the Militia Council appointed a qualified inspector, Lt.-Col. Harston, and he had not been at work long before discovering a very serious condition of affairs.

As a result of his report to Ottawa a couple of Headquarters Staff officers were sent down here and conducted a lengthy investigation, but in order to be doubly sure, the services of two experts from the Woolwich Arsenal were enlisted. It is their report which was recently sent to Ottawa.

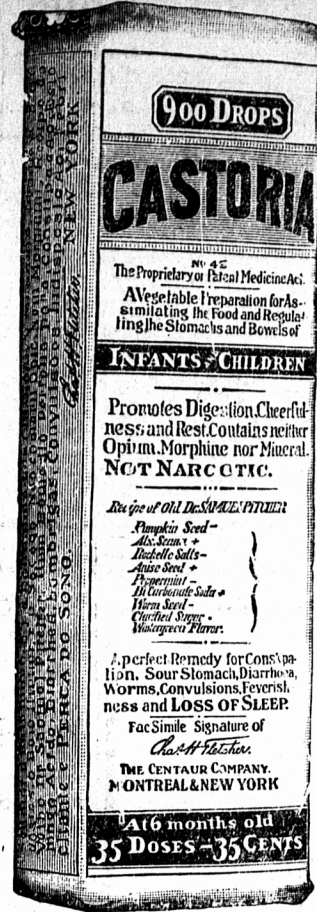
UNFIT FOR ISSUE

From what has been learned here, through official sources, the Arsenal generally and the conditions under which it has been operated are condemned, while as stated millions of rounds of ammunition are found to be unfit for issue to the Militia. The investigation, though very thorough, was conducted with much secrecy, and while very little has been said about it and the conclusions reached, the main facts have leaked out and caused a sensation in local military circles. Further developments are awaited with great interest.

It is understood that one of the primary causes of the trouble was the improper adjustment of the machines used in making the cartridges, with the result that a great part of the millions of rounds was out of line and liable to cause serious accident. All this ammunition must be destroyed or at least made over.

yes in the institution and, to some extent at least, there has been political patronage in their selection. Consequently technical fitness has, in many instances, been lacking. Col. Gaudet, the head of the institution, is retiring in view of the situation that has developed, and numerous changes in the staff are anticipated. The experts will recommend a complete reorganization of the arsenal and a thorough inspection by experts of the ammunition which it sends

out. Meanwhile steps will be taken to save as much as possible of the material which has been condemned and, in its present state, is unfit for use.
