and the benefit of the city in general.

Under such headings they are earnestly advocating improved sanitary conditions in the Public Schools; Safety First especially in its application to children on our streets; the forming of a Public Health Department by the Government and the establishment of Supervised Play Grounds. With these ideals in view it is clear that the Women's City Club has entered upon a campaign which should bring highly beneficial results to Charlottetown.

Beyond doubt every city which has even a minimum of auto traffic requires strict regulations to control it and where Public Schools, open squares and parks front on principal thoroughfares the greatest vigilance is needed to avoid regrettable accidents.

Consistent with this is the idea of supervised play grounds, a movement which has met with great success in most of the large cities of Canada and the United States and goes a long way in uplifting the physical and moral status of countless children who otherwise would spend the formative period of their lives in the environment of the city streets.

Such works as these which are but a few of those sponsored by the organization deserve every encouragement and it is to be hoped that their promotion will secure the support of every fine minded citizen and the hearty co-operation of the civic and provincial governments.

In a letter to Sir Henry Thornton, President of the Canadian National Railways, a passenger draws attention to the dangers incurred by suburban travellers heedlessly ignoring the regulations devised for their safety, and the presence of mind displayed by an employee whereby a tragedy was averted.

Baggageman Fred Binette of the Canadian National Railways proved a friend indeed to seven venturesome passengers on the 5.45 p. m. train out of Montreal to Valdeuil. As the train pulled into Dominion Station a party of seven passengers, anxious to clip a few minutes by leaving the train on the wrong side, hurried through the baggage compartment of the combination car. They were about to jump to the ground when Baggageman Binette caught the sound of an approaching train. He rushed forward and thrust himself in front of the men, pushing them back forcibly. At that instant the fast freight thundered by. The passengers blanched at their narrow escape; but for the baggageman's prompt action they would have been run down.
