Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years of age, may homestead a certain quantity of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must be a settler in person at the Dominion Lands Office by Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by 100 may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions.
Duties.—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years.
Duties.—Six months residence in each of three years on a homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.
In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$5.00 per acre.
Duties.—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 3 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.
A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 3 acres and erect a house, worth \$2.
The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Land so reduced may be substituted for cultivation on other certain conditions.

MAJOR L. N. SEAMAN.

A recent letter conveys the pleasing news that Lieutenant L. N. Seaman, son of Principal Seaman of Prince St. School, this City has been promoted to the command of his Battery (the 349th Siege B. G. A.) with the rank of Major.

Major Seaman is one of the original 1914 soldiers. Immediately on the outbreak of the war he enlisted for garrison duty at Halifax and was appointed adjutant at the garrison. While there he qualified for captaincy and when the Ammunition Column was organized by Capt. (now Major) D. A. McKinnon, he was appointed second in command. Before this column left for overseas he was appointed adjutant by Lt. Col. Cole. This was the regiment of which the 98th Siege, now the 2nd Battery formed a part. While in England Major Seaman had the misfortune of having a leg and arm broken but this misfortune he with his characteristic energy and pluck turned to a good account. While in Hospital he employed his time in studying and by the time he had recovered from his injuries he succeeded in passing the qualifying examination for Major. After leaving the hospital he was transferred to the 349th Siege Battery R. G. A., with this Battery he crossed to France in June last as second in command. Later as previously stated, he was given command of the battery with the rank of Major.

Major Seaman's steady progress upward as a soldier and his excellent character as a man and a student are a guarantee that he will wear his newly won honours with credit to himself and to the great army which is now winning such a glorious place in the history of the Empire. With his many friends the Guardian heartily joins in congratulations on his well merited promotion and with best wishes for his future.

Old Fox Hertling New Chancellor But Not Popular

COPENHAGEN, Nov. 5.—Count George F. von Hertling has been appointed Imperial German Chancellor. This is announced in an official statement received here for Berlin. The Kaiser, in a receipt to Michaelis the retiring Chancellor expresses a desire to employ further in the imperial service. He will take over another high imperial office for which his qualifications are admitted generally.

Has support of Socialists

Berlin correspondent reports that Count von Hertling has succeeded in establishing satisfactory working arrangements with all parties, except the Socialists, and the Conservatives. Even the Socialists, it is added, although not abandoning their attitude of reserve, can be counted upon to make no difficulties for the new Government, unless unforeseen conditions develop. This virtually amounts to a continuance of the sent Reichstag block with the aid support of the National Liberals, the Reichstag the Conservatives would maintain an adverse attitude towards the incoming Chancellor.

It is not known here whether Friedrich von Payer has yet been appointed Vice-Chancellor, or Herr Friedberg, leader of the National Liberal party, been given the post of Vice-President of the Prussian Ministry, although Berlin probably is fully informed of the decision in their cases.

"Old Fox" Hertling. The "Old Fox" is the sobriquet by which Count von Hertling is known in Bavaria, according to the Berlin Tageblatt. The descriptive name, the newspaper says, was given to the Count because of the "back stairs" methods that have characterized his five and a half years' Bavarian premiership.

Life is expected from von Hertling in the direction of internal reforms, the Tageblatt declares. He always opposed parliamentarism, although he acted like a parliamentary minister.

He has never been at any pains during the war to conceal that animosity. Von Hertling was one of the chief advocates of unrestricted U-boat warfare. He is a firm believer in annexation, which, of course, he terms, as he did in a speech delivered no longer than Tuesday of last week, "securing the safety of Germany's frontiers." In February of this year, he said: "We have won all we want. From Germany's point of view there is no reason why the war should continue. He advocates a German

Queen's County Dominion Election

To the Electors of Queen's County, Ladies and Gentlemen:

Six years ago Mr. A. A. McLearn and myself were elected to represent you in the House of Commons. As the result of the election then held the Liberal-Conservative party came into power. During the years that have passed since then I have endeavored to the best of my ability to procure as large a portion as possible of governmental advantages for my native Province. The Government of the party I was elected to support, has done much for the betterment of our trade and commerce and our agricultural interests. It gave us the Car Ferry, increased grants to agriculture, the addition of \$100,000 annually to our provincial subsidy, secured for our Province four members for all time to come, built a number of wharves for the convenience of our farmers and shippers, also dredged the docks at Charlottetown and elsewhere.

When it is considered that for over three years of this period, the Dominion revenues have been urgently required for war purposes, I feel assured that our efforts are not unappreciated by the people of the Province, irrespective of party. I am convinced that what has been done will prove a lasting benefit to the Province and will afford a great impetus to our future prosperity.

During the last session of Parliament I was pleased to support Sir Robert Borden in his endeavors to unite the two great political parties which divide Canada in one Government. Such a consummation would insure a more vigorous prosecution of the war, and would be the means of raising with the least possible friction the necessary recruits to go to the assistance of our hard pressed brave boys at the front.

I am highly gratified that a Union Government has now been formed. It is composed of the strongest men of both parties and shall have my full support.

At the last session of Parliament an Act was passed establishing machinery for the holding of a Dominion election. It provided for the appointment of enumerators to make up lists of voters for all the polls. These will shortly be appointed. May I be permitted to request that every possible assistance be given the enumerators in the preparation of these lists, so that everyone in the County, entitled to a vote, shall have his or her name on the lists before polling day.

In thus giving an account of my Stewardship, permit me to state I shall be candidate for this Country at the coming election.

The crisis which involves our Country is the most important in its history. It devolves upon everyone to consider well the issue raised: are the people of Canada to leave unsupported our brave boys at the Front, who have so long and so well fought for the preservation of our rights and liberties, and whose splendid deeds of heroism have covered Canada with glory and renown? It is impossible.

I respectfully ask for the votes of all true and loyal men and women of this large and intelligent County of Queen's, assuring them that the best interests of our province and especially our soldiers shall have at all times my sincere support.
