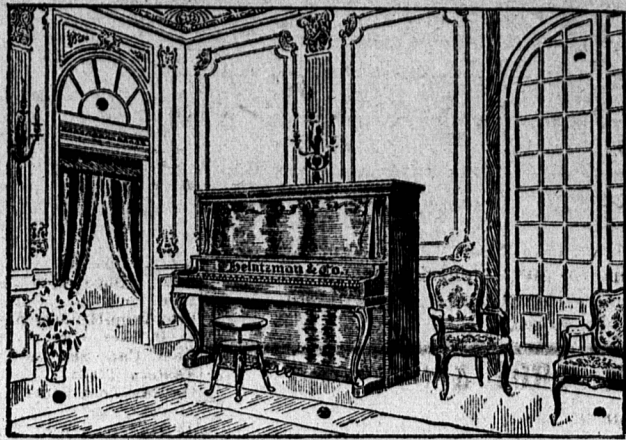

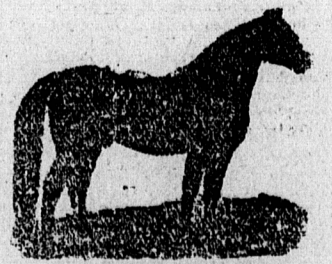
Grand Opening Tea Party
