Cattle Receipts 761.

MONTREAL, March 23.-There
were a greater number of good
steers included in today's cattle
offerings and prices were stronger
in spots. A number of good steers
were sold for export at eight fifty
and good butcher steers brought
from seven fifty to eight dollars,
with a few a shade better. Medium
steers sold from six-fifty to seven
twenty-five and common ones real-
ized from five dollars to six even.
Cows brought four fifty to five-
twenty-five and common ones three
twenty-five and up. Good bulls brought
five fifty and common ones three
fifty to four fifty.

Quotations-Butcher Steers.
Choice 8.25 to 8.50; good 7.50 to
8.00; medium, 6.50 to 7.25; com-
mon 5.00 to 6.25. Butcher Heifers,
good 5.50 to 6.00; medium 3.75 to
5.25; canners 2.00; cutters 2.25 to
2.75; commons 3.50 to 4.50. Calf
Receipts 1497. There were very
few good calves included in the
heavy and trading on the poorer
grade was slow. One lot of good
calves picked out brought 8.80 and
another fair bunch realized 8.00.
Mixed lots of common and medium
calves ranged from 6.50 to 7.00 and
common lots 6.00 with a few down
to 4.50. Condemnation were heavy.
Quotations-Good veal 8.00 to 8.25;
medium 6.50 to 7.00. Common 4.50
to 6.00. Sheep receipts 116, sheep
brought from 6.00 to 7.50 and a few
good yearling lambs thirteen to
thirteen fifty.

Stiff Sentences Handed Crooks

(Canadian Press)
MONTREAL, March 23.-Eight
men will spend the rest of their
natural life in the penitentiary,
twelve others will remain in that
institution for terms varying from
seven to two years, for crimes rang-
ing from chicken stealing to man-
slaughter and robbery of mails, as
the result of sentences imposed by
Mr. Justice Wilson at the court of
Kings Bench today. The maximum
prison terms were given to two
groups of six and two, and another
serious blow was dealt to or-
ganized gang crime. The group of
six were convicted of holding up a
mail van here last August, and a
group of two pleaded guilty to
manslaughter.

"TUNE IN"

There are two distinct species of
radio bugs, the radio "fan" and
the radio "ham." The fan is one
interested in the broadcasting of
radio concerts, while the ham is a
key-pounder and interested in ra-
dio from the telegraphic viewpoint.

Mr. John Holman, manager of
broadcasting for station W.E.A.F.
New York City, after a careful
study of an average of 17,000 "ap-
plause" letters, which were received
every month during 1924, and
which jumped to 54,000 in the
month of January 1925, says, that
the demand for "jazz" has fallen
70 percent in the past two years,
while the demand for the higher
class standard music is decidedly
on the increase. Radio not only en-
tertains but educates at the same
time.

A practical and humane service
is being rendered daily by the com-
bined efforts of station W. N. Y. of
the Radio Corporation of America
and the U. S. Public Health Ser-
vice, in diagnosing and treating
via radio, the illnesses which oc-
cur among the crew and passen-
gers of the ocean going vessels far
out at sea. These vessels although
equipped with medicine chests, do
not have a doctor on board, and
there is no doubt that this service
is the means not only of alleviat-
ing a great deal of suffering, but
of saving numerous lives as well.

Here are some illuminating words
about radio, taken from a recent
radio publication and written by
No. 186, a "Lifer" at New Hamp-
shire State Prison. He is the pos-
sessor of a radio set of his own
construction with which he is oc-
casionaly allowed to entertain his
fellow prisoners.

"The programs as they are at
present are very good indeed. I
have enjoyed nearly everything
that I have heard, including "Bed-
Time Stories!" I listened in on
Santa Claus, who was at WGY one
night, and I could very easily im-
agine the delight with which the
youngsters heard him call them by
their own names and promise to
bring them the presents they had
asked him for! I almost wrote to
him myself!

In my humble opinion, offered
for what little it may be worth, ra-
dio can be of the greatest possible
help to those in prison. In envi-
ronments such as to make them en-
emies of society, as well as to those
who are already so-called "enemies
of society."

Since I came to prison I have
read every book on criminology
that I could get my hands on. I
have talked with nearly all of the
men that have passed through here
in the six years that I have been
inmate. I have come to the con-
clusion that nearly all crime can
be traced to the conditions in the
homes where these fellows were
children. Many of them have been
in so-called Reform Schools. The
prison "term" for a Reform School
is "Prison Kindergarten!" Many
of the fellows ran away from home
and no boy runs away from a home
where he is understood. If we real-
ly wish to diminish crime we must
tackle the problem at its very roots,
and that means the home. Make
every dwelling a real home and
crime will be cut 90 percent!
