LARGEST IN AMERICA.

The building will cost over a million and a half, exclusive of equipment.

GREAT BRITAIN LEADS ON ROAD TO HELL

W. T. Stead's Latest—Would Prefer Straightforward Devils to Canting Christians - The Naval Expenditures.

LONDON, May 4.—Mr. Stead must have astonished some of the "quakers" who heard him recently in the Friends' Meeting House, in St. Martin's-hury by the picturesqueness of his language, says the Chronicle.

It was a meeting to consider some modern aspects of the peace question. Professor St. vanus Thompson presided, and he and Miss Frances Thompson and Mr. Arthur Knoch delivered addresses before Mr. Stead spoke.

It seemed that on Wednesday Sir Wilfrid Lawson and Mr. Stead were discussing the temperance question, and Sir Wilfrid remarked to Mr. Stead, who disagreed with him on some point, "What are you a devil?" Mr. Stead pointed the moral of this agreeable incident.

"I wish, he said, "we could all ask ourselves now and again whether we are devils or men. Sometimes think it would be an improvement if we were honest, square, straightforward devils, instead of being a set of canting Christian hypocrites."

THE ROAD TO HELL.

"As a nation we have a very good opinion of ourselves. We believe ourselves to be the leaders of the world. Yes we lead in one respect," said Mr. Stead, pleasantly; "we are leading on the road to hell."

"When I say I think we are leading all the nations on the downward road, I may startle some of you, but it can be proved from Parliamentary papers on unmistakable authority and accuracy.

"Here are the appalling facts. When the present Government came into office in 1895, the expenditure of Great Britain on the Army and Navy was about thirty-six millions a year. They have increased for the last ten years, and the expenditure

COLONIES' DUTY IF EMPIRE IS ATTACKED

Each Portion Bears Its Share of the Cost of War—A Suggestion Made by the Military Correspondent of The London Times.

LONDON, May 5.—The military correspondent of The Times, writing on the future of modern wars, referring to the partial failure of colonial contributions and the unwillingness on the part of the colonies to promise definite aid in case of war, says: "This unfortunate state of affairs is almost entirely due to the absence of any light or leading on the part of the British Government. It results in this situation that there is practically no broad or any other view of colonial responsibility in relation to Imperial strategy, and that the work of education and reform has to be begun almost from the lowest foundations."

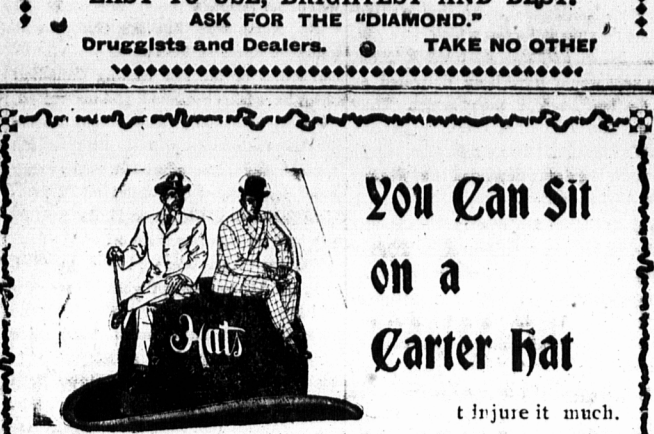
