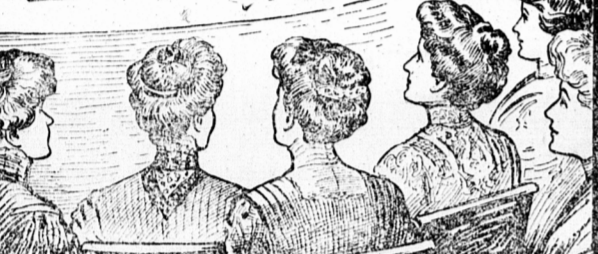

Following are the market prices in Alberton: Butter 22 cents, eggs 20 cents, potatoes 18 cents, white oats 38 cents, black oats 40 cts, fowls 6 to 7 cents per pound, geese 8 cts, ducks 9 and 10 cents and turkeys 10 cents. Loose hay is \$7 to \$8 per ton. Pork 7 1/2 cents, oysters \$3 a barrel and smelts 3 cents per pound.

Butter was selling at twenty-one to twenty-two cents per lb. in Summerside yesterday, eggs at eighteen and a half to nineteen and a half, hay (loose) at eight to nine dollars and straw at four-fifty per ton, black oats at forty and white oats at thirty nine, pork at six and a half to seven and a half cents per lb, potatoes at eighteen to twenty and turnips at thirteen cents per bushel.

The special meetings, which have been held for the past three weeks in Wilnot, have been marked with wonderful power and have proved to be times of refreshing. A work of grace has been wrought in many lives. They will therefore be continued this week, closing on Friday evening, Rev. W. B. Crowell will preach each night, except Thursday, and the music will be under the charge of Mrs. Crowell.

Chas. McFarlane of Lower Bedeque, met with a very painful accident yesterday morning. He was unloading a quantity of pork at Col-es wharf, Bedeque, when the horses started to run away. Mr. McFarlane in endeavoring to stop them, slipped and fell and the wheels passed over his legs. He was brought to Summerside on the steamer Bedeque and medical attendance was summoned, but it was found that no bones were broken although his legs were very badly cut. The Bedeque made an excellent trip to take the injured man to his home.

The adjourned meeting of the Summerside town Council was held last night the Mayor and all the councillors present. A letter was read from the recorder, with reference to the request of the Sisters of St. Mary's Convent that they be granted free water for school purposes in which he stated that in his opinion the town could not grant free water to any person. The question of the salary of the water and sewerage commissioner was again brought up upon which question Commissioners Grady and Hinton addressed the council. It was decided to grant the same salary to the commissioner from the time the system was completed (Sept. 14) until Dec. 19 as that which they had received during the construction. The matter of salary after Dec. 19th was laid over. The clerk was instructed to ask the chief of the fire department to have the town divided off into divisions or wards for fire alarm purposes. Rubber boots and coats were granted to the east end fire company as requested after which the council adjourned.
