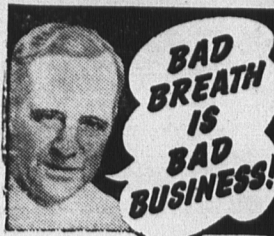

### WAR WILL GIVE CHILDREN CHANCE TO KNOW PARENTS

#### With Gas And Tire Shortage, Families Will Be Inclined To Stay Home

Out of evil good not infrequently comes, and one of the blessings of this war is that it will give parents and children an opportunity to get acquainted with one another, a pleasure which they have not heretofore enjoyed.

What with Mom and Pop doing a lot of stepping out themselves, and the youngsters being sent off to schools in Winter and camps in Summer and rushed with sub-deb parties during their vacations, and there being two cars in too many garages, home has come to mean merely a sort of halfway station between dates to thousands of families whose members scarcely know one another by sight. No sort of intimacy exists between them and it is a literal truth that many a woman talks more freely to her manicurist than she does to her own daughters; and many a man knows far more about the hopes and ambitions of his office boy than he does about his sons.

Charge this partly to the tempo of modern life, which has given us too many things to do and too little time in which to do them, and to the curious barrier which their very relationship raises between parents and children and which none of them knows how to break down. For fathers and mothers feel that they must pose as little tin gods before their children, and children know that they must pretend to believe in their infallibility. Hence it is the hardest thing in the world for them to find any common ground together ground on which they can be intimate friends who can say what they think to each other.

So when Junior comes home from college and Mary returns from a finishing school they and their parents are as much strangers to each other as though they had never met before. And, as of the past, neither one has seen in the other anything that made them very keen about getting to know the other better.

The children have seen in their mother only a fussy, middle-aged woman whose clothes were all wrong, who didn't know how to put on her complexion and whose nosiness they resented when she asked them where they were going, who they were going with and how long they expected to be out, and their father to them was just another ordinary, commonplace business man who had in some way—they couldn't imagine how—managed to get along in the world, but whose opinions were of no importance, and whose chief function, so far as they were concerned, was signing checks.

And to the parents John and Mary were a source of mingled pride and disappointment. They were proud of their good looks and their sophisticated airs, but they resented their patronage and condescension and inwardly wondered whether it was worthwhile to spend so much money on two such snobs.

There the situation has stood ever since home ceased to be a place of dispersal where they took to the automobile and got as far away as possible. But now, with our tires being taken from us and our gas at home because there will be no way to get anywhere else.

This will give parents and children and brothers and sisters the first opportunity they have had really to know one another and to revise their opinions of each other.

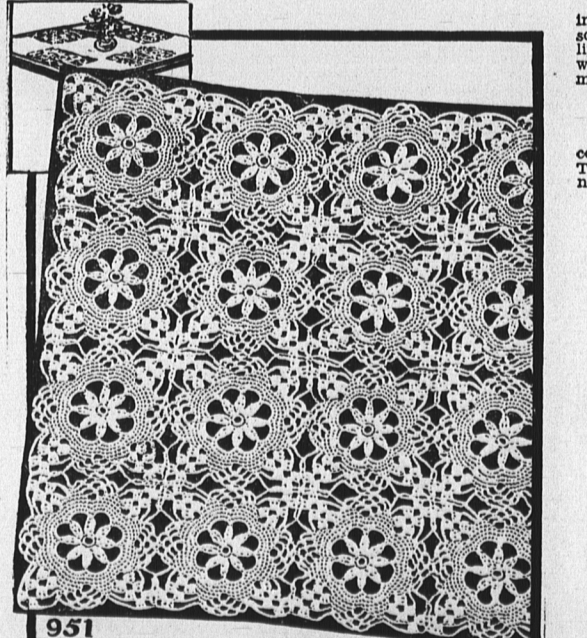

## THE COOK'S CORNER

### 3543 SIZES 4 TO 10 PANTIES INCLUDED

### HONEY COOKIES

One-quarter cup water, 2 cups brown sugar, packed, 1-2 cup lard, 1 cup honey, 1-3 cup egg yolks, 1 teaspoon soda, 3 cups flour and 3 cups whole wheat flour, 1 teaspoon powdered cardamom seed, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, 1-2 teaspoon salt. Heat the water, sugar, lard and honey until the lard is melted. When cool, add the yolks of the eggs and the flour, sifted with the soda, and spices.

To pack these for overseas, they should be cut out the same size as the container in which you are going to ship them and a sheet of waxed paper should be placed between each cookie. They may be formed into an oblong and chilled overnight in icebox. Then slice (do not slice these cookies to thin) and bake in the morning.

Peanut Butter Oatmeal cookies are also good for overseas parcels. Any cookies must be packed carefully with a sheet of waxed paper between them. Ginger Snaps make good overseas packages because they are hard.

### PEANUT BUTTER OATMEAL COOKIES

One cup peanut butter (or 1-2 cup peanut butter mixed with 1-2 cup peanut butter crush) 1-2 cup butter, 1 cup golden corn syrup, 1-2 cup sugar, 2 eggs, 1 1/2 cups rolled oats or oatmeal, 2 cups unsifted cake flour, 3/4 teaspoon salt, 1 tea-spoon baking soda, 1 teaspoon baking powder. Into mixing bowl, put peanut butter, butter, corn syrup, sugar and eggs. Beat well. Sift in the flour, salt, soda and baking powder. Mix well, and drop by teaspoonfuls on cookie sheet which has been oiled. Bake at 375 degrees Fahr. (moderately hot) until golden. These Peanut Butter Oatmeal Cookies spread very little—but should be dropped about 3 inches apart.
