MR. MATHIESON asked for a statement of the rights of way purchased since 1898 and not opened up.

HON. MR. CUMMISKEY said that information in regard to any particular road would be furnished, but it would be tedious to examine all the records for twelve years past.

HON. MR. HUGHES moved to amend to the clause concerning the inspection of meats, poultry, etc. so as to provide also for inspection of the premises where such meats are sold or kept for sale.

MR. COX spoke of the importance of protecting groceries and candies in shop windows from contamination by flies.

HON. MR. HUGHES thought the clause respecting medical examination of school children went too far. He thought the inspector should only visit the homes when parents consent thereto.

MR. WYATT said the City Council represented the citizens and they had asked for this bill. He would strengthen rather than weaken the bill.

MR. McLEAN moved the House into committee to consider the bill to incorporate the Canada Dextrino Company, Limited, Mr. McKinnon in the chair.

MR. MATHIESON moved the House into committee on the bill to change the name of Frederick Duncan Burke to Berkeley. The applicant had long ago removed from the Province and found it convenient to transact insurance business in which he was engaged under the name of Berkeley.

HON. MR. CUMMISKEY moved the House into committee on a resolution to amend rule 44 of the House. He explained that the object of the change was to provide that when the House adjourns on Saturday it shall stand adjourned till the following Tuesday afternoon.

MR. MATHIESON raised the point of order that this resolution must emanate from the standing committee on Rules and Orders.

HON. MR. CUMMISKEY explained that he had verbally consulted the members of the committee, who were agreeable to the change.

MR. MATHIESON thought there should be a meeting of the committee and that the rules should be generally revised, so as to follow pretty closely the practice of the Canadian House of Commons.

HON. MR. RICHARDS moved the motion was withdrawn.
