## SMYRNA THREATENED

### Miss Stone and Mrs. Tsilka Reported Alive and Well

**FRENCH FLEET AT MITYLENE.**  
PARIS, Nov. 5.—(Special)—Admiral Caillard's squadron against Turkey today occupied three ports on the Island of Mytilene from which a move will be made on Smyrna if further action becomes necessary.

## WRITING HOME

### From South Africa to His Parents

## CAPT. GEO. S. BEER

### Of The Constabulary Gives Interesting Details Of the War.

**JACOBSDAL, O. R. C., Oct. 3rd, 1901.**

**MY DEAR PARENTS.**—Here I am in Jacobsdal and actually sitting down in a comfortable house to write you. Well we have been moving about as usual and just now we are here under orders for another three weeks' trek. Possibly after we get that over and done with we may have a rest and get to our police district. I am in excellent health and I cannot find much fault with anything out here. The climate so far is fine. Rather hot now and it will be hotter before long, but six months of the year are absolutely perfect. My work is of the most pleasant and I love it. The country some day will be beautiful. As it is now it shows the marks of war very plainly. When a 15 pound shell chases a Boer into a house and explodes, there generally is considerable to be imagined about the outlines of the said house afterward, and Tommy, our old friend Tommy Atkins, loves a tree for his evening piece of mutton, etc., and he is not one bit particular about where the tree comes from, either an orange or a shade tree does. One cannot blame Tommy. He is grand, and if anyone is ever inclined to think Thomas is degenerating, let him come on him in a dark night unawares away on some lonely outpost, (as I have.) The low "Halt! who goes there?" does not exhibit any tendency toward nervousness, and the business-like ring of his rifle bolt, as it comes sharply back makes me always glad that I can answer "friend." Now, parents dear, here is something I can vouch for as true. Tommy Atkins is marching over this hot veldt, tired, clothes often in rags, sometimes and often on half rations, (my men were all one day from 4 a. m. till 8 p. m. on two biscuits each and hardly once out of the saddle,) and Tommy is doing this cheerfully. But while this is going on the refugees, (Boer women and men who are under British protection, not saying that they have not, both sexes, been the cause of many of our men being short at roll call,) are living most comfortably in houses provided by us, good food provided by us, good clothes also, and in fact everything they need. And yet in face of all of this those idiotic British papers publish the worst rot imaginable about our treatment of our prisoners and refugees. About the Boers now in the field I consider them as a whole a most honorable foe, and that they are good fighters, no one need say that over again.

The hard feature of the war now is that most of those now left in the field are "bigwomers," (pronounced by oners,) which means the lazy class who until the war always lived on their parents. They have all their wives well cared for by the British. They have no property and as they are generally reported, I said, "why should we stop fighting; we repaid by Oom Paul likely and fed and are having a good time. It is better than our former life." So there you are, that covers practically the whole question. Until we catch these duffers, we cannot consider peace has come. The country is being temporarily ruined by these idiots and the level headed Dutch see it as we do.

Well, I hear we are off for a long trek again, so don't be alarmed if you don't hear from me again for a while.

I do wish I knew where Madge and baby are. I hear one of our Canadian officer's wives (Mrs. ToTkes) is expected at any time in Cape Town. She was to come out with Madge, so I am hoping for a telegram soon. Still I asked her to cable me when she started and I have not received a message yet. That may be because the message has been delayed or lost. My mail comes along in bunches, generally two months old. But it is a welcome. Mother you are a jewel of a correspondent, so is Will. I prize father's letters very highly as I know letter-writing is very tiring to him. I often imagine you at home. You go to the Post Office and get your letters from a box. You should see us get a bag for my troops. Possibly after or during a hard day's trek we hear there is a mail bag for us. I always see it if it is so then throwing the bag on my shoulder, walk quickly over to where my men are, some asleep near their saddles and others lying around and resting. I get up as close as I can, then call out loud, "Fall in for mail." You should see the rush. Down I sit on the veldt and pour out the letters, etc., and personally hand them out. It is as good as a treat to hear some of the remarks as the men see bundles of tobacco, etc., that their friends have sent out. I always listen very attentively to my men's conversation after a mail issue as I ride at their head on the march. I

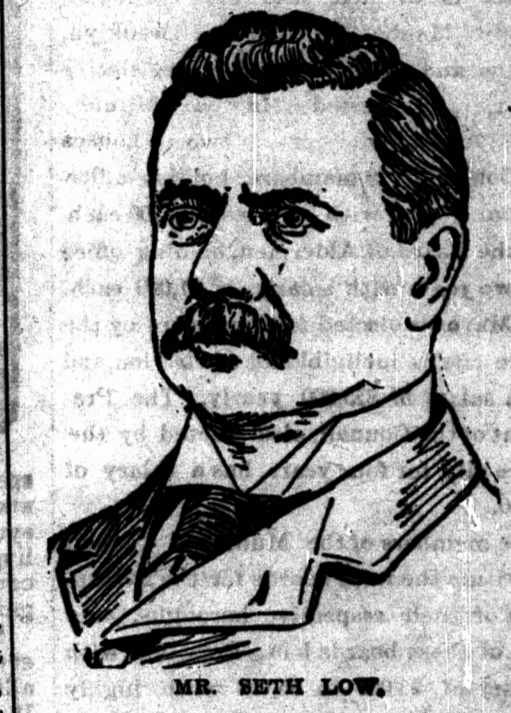
## A COLD RAINY DAY

### BOERS CARRIED OFF THE GUNS.

**LONDON, Nov. 5.**—(Special)—Lord Kitchener in a further report on the recent engagement near Brakeniaagte says the Boers took away the guns captured from Benson's column under cover of an ambulance.

### BOER LOSSES WERE HEAVY.

The Boer losses were heavy. Commandant Opperman was killed and Chiers Botha wounded. The Boers behaved badly to the British wounded.

### CAPE COLONY NEARLY CLEAR.

Cape Colony is now clear of Boers except for one Commandant and 400 men with whom Gen. French is dealing.
