...NEW ENGINE—Mr. Jack Whalen, Baltic, purchased a new gasoline engine last week and will use it in connection with his wood-work shop.

...LUCKY NAP.—Chas. Stewart, Kingsboro, caught a couple of wild geese napping last week and as a result of their carelessness Mr. Stewart is feeding on wild geese.

...PORK HIGH.—Owing to the unusual high price for pork during the past few months there is a real scarcity of young pigs throughout the eastern district. It is not the hogs that are grunting now.

...POULTRY.—The poultry meetings held by Mr. Benson in this district the past week were largely attended. Judging from the interest taken by poultrymen one should expect a large amount of improvement in this important line.

...EARLY BIRD.—The blue crane has arrived at East Point, but is somewhat premature. Owing to the cool spring he has to do most of his fishing through the ice which seems quite reluctant about leaving the ponds and rivers.

...FISHING.—Messrs. Jerome Chapman and Stephen Lapierre will catch lobsters at Red Point this season. The license and stand of the McLellan Packing Co. being acquired by a Souris firm, a number of boats will fish this water during the open season starting the 26th. Looking back about thirty-five years ago when the Shanks fishery was running in Fortune, the fishermen would row up to Red Point, haul their dory up to a rock just off the Cove—and which can still be seen at low tide—load their dory with lobsters using only an ordinary dipnet, receiving as payment the most expensive and scientific method must be used, and the fisherman receives as high as five and six dollars per hundred pounds for their fish.

...BUILDERS' PAY RAISED IN MONTREAL. MONTREAL, April 16.—The board of control today fixed the schedule of wages for the building trades, which will be inserted in all civic contracts for buildings this year. The increase is about ten per cent. over the rate paid a year ago. Controller Ainsie stated tonight that the board was following current rates paid generally in Montreal.

The controllers have received schedules from the builders exchange and the building trades council, and both agreed in most particulars. Controller Ainsie also remarked that the city was acting in harmony with the builders exchange for such important trades as those of the carpenters, bricklayers, plasterers, and some others. The increase for the bricklayers was five cents an hour, for carpenters 2 1/2 cents, and plasterers the whole. Controller Ainsie stated the city rates would be thought, represent current rates to be paid in Montreal this season.

...WHITENING THE NECK. Until my attention was called to the neck by the present fashion of wearing low "V" shaped neckwear in the street, I had not realized how neglected the neck has been and how it has resented its lack of care. I am not speaking of the shoulders and bust, but of just that portion of anatomy which connects the head to the body, beginning at the back with the hair and coming to the spread of the shoulders behind, and in front extending from the round of the chin to just below the collarbones. The face may have a bright and clear skin, but the neck be sallow and dried, with a necklace of wrinkles encircling it. The neck, indeed, needs sympathetic and immediate attention.

"I wonder," writes one reader, "if there is any possibility of a woman forty years old whitening the skin of her neck. It is not vanity which prompts this question: I suffer so much from the heat that I cannot wear a band around my neck, except in winter, I am ashamed of my dark skin in that particular place.

Dark and sallow necks are not the result of age, but the result of unconscious neglect. When a woman takes a hot tub bath to remove the accumulated epithelium, the neck does not come in for its share of the water, for she stretches her neck out of the water so as to keep her hair dry. Consequently the skin of the neck is defrauded of its share in the bath. The outer layers of skin are not shed, but remain to become darker and rougher.

If, therefore, you would whiten your neck, wrap around it, while in the tub, a towel wrung out of very hot water, and keep it wet all the time you are in the tub. Rub the neck with the pulp of your fingers after you have soaked it thus for twenty minutes or a half an hour and you will find that the dead and dark skin will rub up in little rolls. Use a flesh brush after that with plenty of soap to make a good lather. If you do this three times a week you will find that the skin of the neck will whiten, unless it is tanned by exposure to the sun.

To prevent that undesirable demarcation which is often seen when one exchanges a high-neck gown for a decollete, you must protect the neck from the sun's rays in summer and from cold and exposure in winter.

Other letters complain of small warts coming on the neck, and of the skin of the neck being rough. A rough skin is usually the condition of those necks upon which after a time the tiny excrescences, called warts, appear. Generally these warts are small, but sometimes they are quite sizeable. The roughness of the neck often comes from the neglect of

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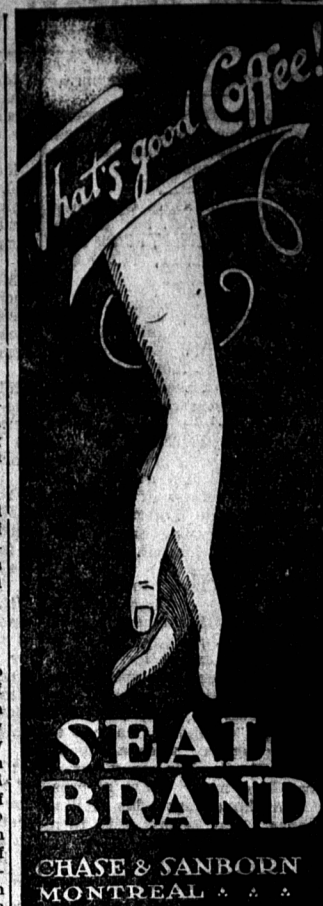

proper washing, of which I have just spoken, so care should be taken to scrub the neck to improve the skin and the circulation of the blood in it. The little warts come from irritating colors or collars which are too tight. The best way to remove the warts is to clip them off. If they are small, these should be seized with a pair of tweezers and stretched out so as to make the attachment to the skin taut and narrow, and then snipped off with a pair of sharp scissors. The neck should be thoroughly cleaned first. After the wart has been cut off, apply a bit of absorbent cotton, holding the finger upon it to prevent the bleeding. If the warts are large, it is best to tie tightly around the base a piece of white silk, the end of which can be put off after the knot is tied tightly. This ligature will prevent bleeding. One should not remove too many of these at a time. It is difficult to do it for one's self. The appearance of the neck will be much improved, however, by the removal of these unsightly little growths.

## FRIEDMANN'S GUIDING LIGHT

BEHLIN, April 15.—Fraulein Zoeh, the one person in all the world who shares with Dr. Friedrich Franz Friedmann the secret of his "turtie serum" "cure" for tuberculosis, is now on route to New York to set aright the difficulties of the bacteriologist with members of the medical profession and sceptics who hesitate in placing confidence in his discovery.

The young woman—she is just twenty-eight years old—is said to be possessed of a marvellous personality. Some claim she has hypnotic powers. She is wealthy in her own right, by turns quick of speech or decision upon important issues, and then seems extremely taciturn.
