REGISTRATION CARDS

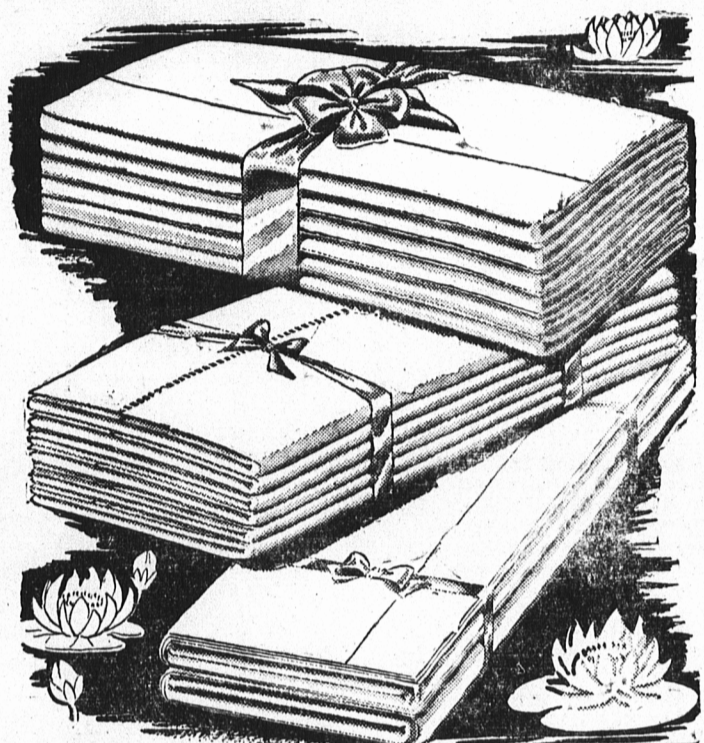

"Battle Of Britain" Welcomed Across The Border Americans Aid Queen's Fund As "Evidence of Goodwill"

The "Battle of Britain," the Air Ministry's official account of the RAF's victory over the Luftwaffe in the latter months of last year, which was published early in May, has been warmly welcomed in the United States.
