Important Notice To Farmers And Buyers Regarding Thin Hogs

It will doubtless surprise you when we state that fully 50 p. c. of the hogs being marketed are altogether too thin, underfed and positively unfit for packing purposes—and if this is continued the Pork business of P. E. I., will be seriously injured.

We fear the practice of selling and buying thin hogs has grown upon us unconsciously, because of the demand for meats cut from hogs 120 to 180 lbs, and in the desire to get hogs within those weights, we have overlooked what is of equal importance, namely the fact that hogs at any weight must be well fed, properly finished, thick and plump, otherwise there is no sale for the product.

We have done our best to make this generally known, yet the tendency to kill thin hogs seems to be greater at present than at anytime in the past, until today it is the exception to get hogs that are properly finished.

Finally for the protection of the industry, as well as in our own interest, we must positively refuse to receive from our buyers or of the market any hogs, no matter what weight, that are not put in good condition (fat and thick) and this is in the farmer's interest as the last two or three weeks feeding must be the most profitable.
