### MURRAY HARBOR NORTH AND VICINITY

On Thursday, the 11th inst., Messrs Thomas Miller and David Sencabaugh, representing the congregation of Murray Harbor North Presbyterian Church and Mr. Graham, representing the congregation of the Peters Road Church elders appeared before the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island in support of a call from these congregations in favor of Rev. Peter Watson Currie, who has been acting as pastor there for the past four months. The said Presbytery found the call was largely signed by members and adherents of these congregations, and otherwise, in order promising a stipend of eighteen hundred dollars per annum, with use of Manse and Glebe and a month's vacation in each year. After due deliberation, the Presbytery sustained the call as being a regular Gospel call and ordered it placed in the hands of Mr. Currie, who was present and requested him to intimate his mind in the matter if prepared to do so, although the law of the Presbytery in Canada allows 30 days for the decision in these matters to be given. In a brief but succinct address, Rev. Mr. Currie intimated his acceptance of the call to the satisfaction of the Presbytery, and the motion of Rev. Mr. Rodger duly seconded. The following arrangements were made for his induction which will take place in the church at Murray Harbor North on Tuesday evening, the 23rd inst., at 7:30 p. m. The Moderator of Session, Rev. T. A. Rodger, will preside on this occasion, the Rev. R. Moorhead Legate, the recently inducted Minister of St. James Presbyterian Church, Charlottetown, will conduct divine service and preach the sermon. The Moderator of Presbytery, the Rev. Chas. St. Clair Jeans, of Summerside, will answer the prescribed questions and induct the minister.

### Auditors Score Accounts System of St. John's, Nfld.

SERIOUS DISCREPANCIES AND CARELESSNESS REVEALED IN REPORT OF EXAMINERS

ST. JOHN'S Nfld., Sept. 12.—Following an investigation into the financial affairs of the Municipal Council, covering a period of seven months, by chartered accountants, an exhaustive report was issued today showing many unsatisfactory features in the financial administration and recommending a thorough reorganization of the whole system of keeping accounts.

The net funded debt of the municipality for the government is \$1,648,905.64 bearing interest at from 3 1-2 to 6 1-2 percent, costing the city for the past seven years an annual interest payment of \$87,000 which, with the interest on the funded debt amounting to \$455,428 has reached at its highest point 30 percent of the total annual revenue. When the late council went out of office in December, 1929, it left a deficit of \$92,000.

The report strongly criticizes the budgeting system in operation as well as the method of appraising property. Arrears of taxes are shown to have grown from \$75,000 in 1921 to \$130,000 in 1929.

## "GHOST DIRECTS KANAKA SAILORS IN VAIN RESCUE"

CANBERRA, Sept. 14.—Because they believed that the ghost of their master was watching them, the Kanaka crew of the motorship Valviri made heroic efforts to save his wife and children when the ship foundered in a tempest off the coast of Papua, Australia's tropical dependency.

Lieutenant Stewart Berge, senior resident magistrate of New Guinea, with his wife and four children and a Kanaka crew of 26 was travelling down the coast when the storm broke. The ship sank, leaving Kanakas and white persons clinging to pieces of wreckage.

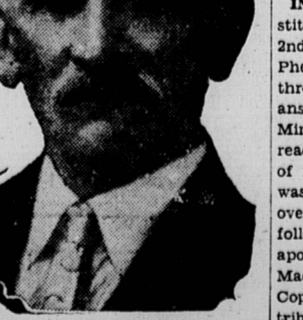
"You save Misses and the little white fella's," was Lieutenant Berge's last order to the Kanakas. "All time, all time, I watch."

The Kanakas, though half of them drowned one by one, never ceased their efforts to save Mrs. Berge and her children.

Eight hours later a rescue steamer found thirteen semi-conscious Kanakas weakly supporting Mrs. Berge, unconscious. Every other person aboard the Valviri was drowned.

### A Revolution in Argentina

goyen stirred considerable popular feeling against himself. Regarded as too aggressive in this direction and too passive in relations to attempts the people consider the Government ought to have made to alleviate the hard times that Argentina, in common with other countries, is experiencing, the deposed President saw friends alienated and the people become generally impatient under his rule, or misrule. Their discontent found expression in the week-end revolt, direction of which was taken over by the military and navy. Success in the object aimed at was attained with comparatively few casualties and the country is reported to be rapidly settling down, contented in the prospect of a return in due course, and in a constitutional way, to a rule of government which will be less dictatorial and more rational than it has been latterly under Dr. Irigoyen. The methods by which the actual change has been brought about may not be commended, but the revolution, at all events, has not been destructive in the sense that often had to be applied in describing similar events in the past. Reaction, in the instance, does not seem likely to be unfavorable to the Argentine, so that it may be reasonable to anticipate that the country will resume the path of peaceful development and to believe at the same time that the revolt will in no way interfere with the plans of the contemplated British Empire trade exhibition at Buenos Aires, nor prejudice the outlook for its success.

### HISTORICAL IRISH JAIL IS GIVEN TO COUNTY COUNCIL

DUBLIN, Sept. 14.—The Kilmainham jail, which has played a prominent part in Irish history, has been abandoned finally as a place of detention and handed over to the Dublin county council for other disposition.

The graves of two men executed there after the Phoenix murders in 1882 are indicated by stone slabs now overgrown with weeds, and marks on the wall testify to the spot on which the leaders of the Easter 1916 rising met their death.

Frank Teeling while awaiting execution there, after the murders of 14 British officers in November 1920, was rescued from the jail under dramatic circumstances. Charles Stewart Parnell's room is still pointed out.

In the prison bank are the names of John Dillon, Thomas Seaton, William O'Brien, and William Redmond, father of the present Irish M.P., who fell fighting in Flanders in 1917.

### LEADERS CHANGE PLACES


As the Eleventh Canadian Egg Laying Contest at the Dominion Experimental Farm, Ottawa, enters the home stretch it finds the leading pens changing places. The pen of Barred Plymouth Rocks entered by Mrs. W. J. Thompson of Saskatchewan which led the contest through the first forty weeks has dropped to second place; first place is now held by a pen of White Leghorns entered by Richard Green with a total score of 1924.3, or a lead of 29.8 points over the Barred Rocks. The race for second place is very close, and the third pen is only 13.1 points ahead of the fourth.

First and second place in best individual birds is held by a Rhode Island Red and a Barred Plymouth Rock respectively, with records of 229 and 225 eggs to date.
