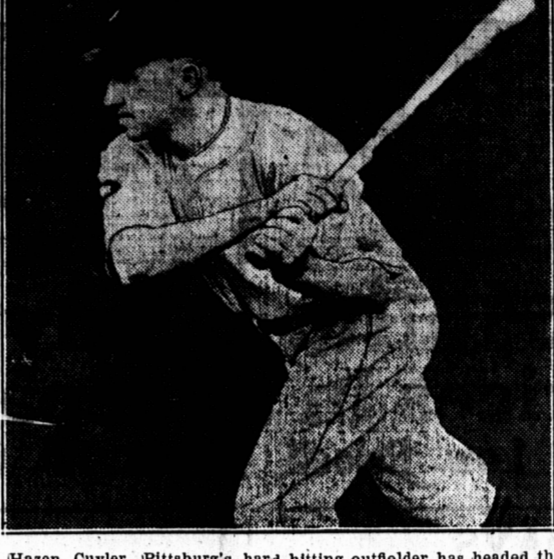

"I have done my best to carry on," said Suzanne in telephoning to the clubhouse her decision to retire, "but I cannot go further because of the pain I am suffering."

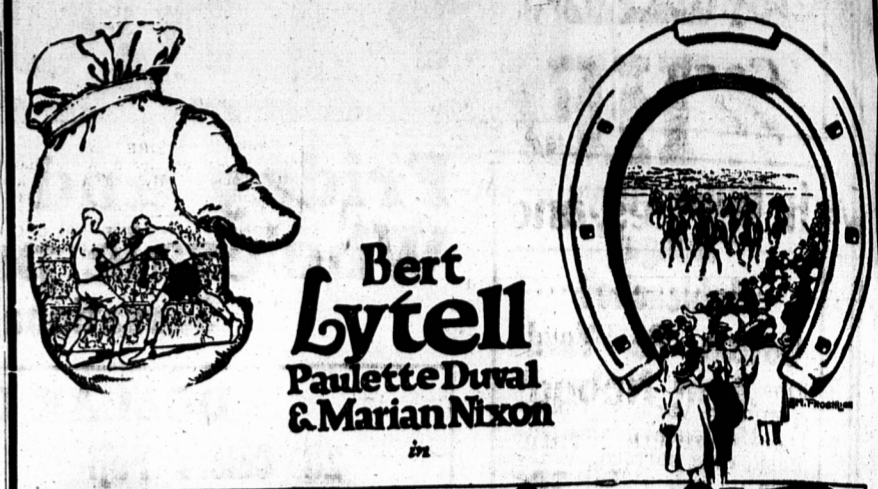
