

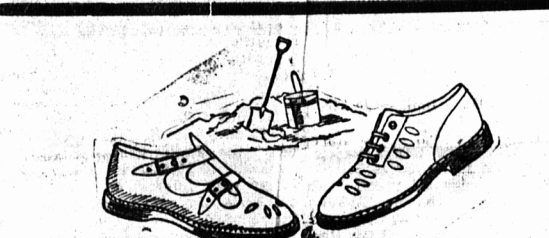

Promotion For Prince Edward Islander

The April issue of the Canadian National Railways Magazine contains the following article regarding the appointment of Dr. John McCombe, as Medical Superintendent of the Canadian National Railway, which appointment was announced on March 1st, in a circular issued by Sir Henry Thornton, K. B. E., Chairman and President of the C. N. R. The article reads as follows:

Dr. McCombe is a native of Belfast, Ireland, where he received his early education in the public schools of Wesleyan College, Dublin. He received his medical degree at McGill University, Montreal, later training at St. George's Hospital, and London School of Tropical Medicine, with a post-graduate course in London.

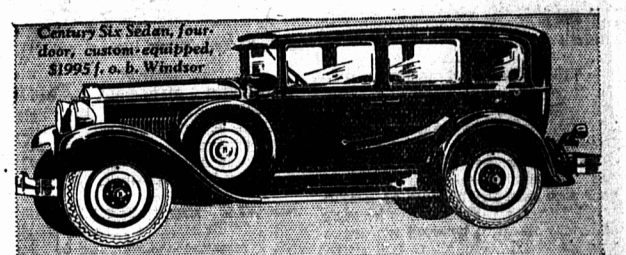
In 1901, he became Ship's Surgeon on the Elder Dempster Line and, from 1902 to 1906, was engaged in private practice at Buckingham, P.Q., and East Templeton. From 1906 to 1914 he was successively Medical Officer of the National Transcontinental Railway, Grand Trunk Pacific, Quebec and Saguenay Railway and the Welland Ship Canal, and while engaged in this work studied under General Gorgas, at the Panama Canal. In 1914 he enlisted for overseas service in the Canadian Army Medical Corps and, in 1915, became Commanding Officer of the Bromley Hospital, with the rank of Captain, later being transferred to the same position in connection with the Monks Horton Hospital. In 1916, he became Inspector of Hospitals of the Canadian Army Medical Corps, with the rank of Major, and the year following Assistant Director of Medical Services in the Canadian Army Medical Corps, with the rank of Lieutenant-Colonel. In the same year he was a member of the special mission to Washington in connection with ambulance trains for France. In 1918, Dr. McCombe was Special Medical Representative for the Director of General Medical Services (England, France, Italy, etc.) in connection with war disablenents. Following demobilization, in 1919, he resumed the position of Chief Medical Officer of the Welland Ship Canal, and, in 1923, became Chief Inspector of Hospitals for the Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment, which position he held up to the time of his present appointment. During the above period, Dr. McCombe also acted as Consultant in Industrial Medicine and Hygiene for various companies.
