SAFE ARRIVAL—Mr D. Nicholson, M.P., received a cablegram yesterday morning announcing the safe arrival in Liverpool, England, of his daughter, Miss Elsie Nicholson, who left Halifax as a trained nurse for the front.

GOOD SEND OFF—Quite a large crowd assembled at the Railway Station yesterday morning to say good-bye to the men of the 55th Overseas Battalion who left for Sussex under command of Capt. G. H. Campbell and Lieutenants Martin and Rogers. The men were accompanied from the Armories by the Band of the 82nd Regiment which played excellent patriotic pieces.

CENTRAL CHRISTIAN—Rev. E. A. Westmoreland of York occupied the pulpit of the Central Christian Church Sunday at both morning and evening services. His subject for the morning was "The Godward Aspect of the European War" and the evening "Our Distinctive Message." Mr. Westmoreland preached two eloquent and instructive sermons, and those who had the privilege of hearing him, will not soon forget his practical application of Bible truths to every day condition. His references to the terrible war which is now raging in Europe were truly and well pointed and left a lasting impression on his hearers. The music of the day was well rendered and the Anthem "Jesus, my Strength, My Hope," given by the choir at the evening service was well received by the large congregation present. Miss Dorothy McDonald and Mr. C. L. MacKay, taking the solo parts. Mr. Whitehead preached at York at both services.

PATRIOTIC ABSTINENCE LEAGUE—At a meeting of the General Committee of the Patriotic Abstinence League held last evening, partial returns of the pledges signed in the city were received when it was found 1,200 signatures had been obtained. This would materially help the committee. Dr. Fullerton reported that he visited the drill shed yesterday morning and as a result practically all the eighty recruits who were bound for Sussex, left pledged to total abstinence.

ISLANDER PROMOTED—Norman W. Louther, who resigned his position as Principal of Kensington High School, to enlist for overseas service in the 6th C.M.R., has been promoted to the rank of sergeant. Sergeant Louther returned to Amherst on Saturday after spending a few days at his home in Kensington.

GIRLS' HOME FILLED—At a meeting of the board of governors of the Maritime Home for Girls in Truro the following officers were elected: Rev. Gordon Dickie, St. John, chairman; Rev. G. W. Glendenning, New Glasgow, secretary; J. O. Oxley, Halifax, treasurer. The executive is composed of Bishop Richardson, Principal Cummings of Truro; Dr. Bond of Halifax; Miss Carmichael of New Glasgow. There are now twenty-one girls in the home, and another building to accommodate fifteen to twenty more will be erected as soon as possible. Of the twenty-one girls now there, two are from New Brunswick, three from P. E. Island, and the rest from Nova Scotia.

OVERSEAS BATTALION—Yesterday the acting Adjutant of the 82nd Regiment received word from Officer commanding the 55th Overseas Battalion that Lieutenant Stewart B. Simpson, of "A" company, 82nd Regiment, son of Rev. Canon Simpson, had been recommended to take the place of Lieutenant C. B. Martin in the 55th who has been ordered to go forward with the reinforcement company from the Battalion. The O. C. 55th Battalion stated that he was much pleased with the number of men recruited on the island and hoped that more would follow. Captain Campbell left yesterday morning with seventy-six men for Sussex, N. B. He had hoped to secure one hundred and twenty, and many that have done so; and he thought there is yet a chance to make up the shortage. Young men of Charlottetown and rural districts should ask themselves "Dare I stand aside in the hour of my Empire's distress?" Some of the young men cannot go, but duty must be done so; and it is to those who can the call comes strongly. The country's safety is at stake. She needs the aid of every man who can pull a trigger to-day! Those wishing to enlist may hand in their names to Captain T. E. MacNutt, Acting Adjutant, 82nd Regiment, Charlottetown.

STOCK NOTES.

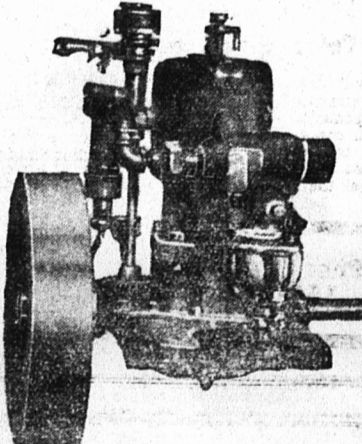
