LEMON MERINGUE PIE

3/4 cup sugar
2 tablespoons flour
3 tablespoons cornstarch
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 1/2 cups boiling water
2 egg yolks
3/4 cup sugar
Juice of 2 lemons
Grated rind of 1 lemon
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
Meringue
Mix together the
cornstarch and salt.
Place in a saucepan and gradually
stirring constantly. Cook the mixture, stirring

frequently, until it is thick.
Beat the egg yolks with the 3/4 cup sugar until thick. Add a small amount of the cooked mixture to this mixture and stir until well blended. Now turn this into the rest of the cooked mixture. Cook for about 2 minutes longer, or until the egg yolks have thickened. Add the lemon juice and the grated lemon rind, stirring until mixed thoroughly into the cooked mixture. Cool and then pour into a baked pie shell. Cover the filling with a meringue and bake in a moderately slow oven (325 deg. F.) for about 15 to 20 minutes, or until the meringue is delicately browned.

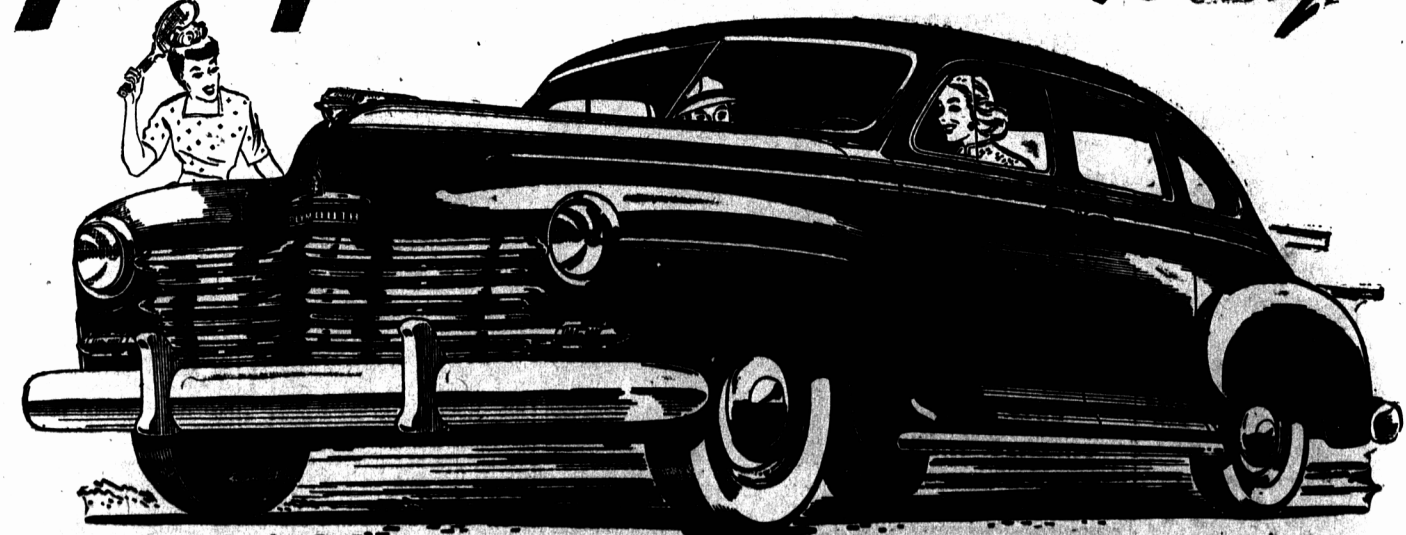
