THE FISHERIES OF THE PROVINCE

Discussed at the Quarterly Meeting of the Board of Trade Last Night—Many Members of the Legislature Present—An Able Address by W. F. Tidmarsh on Our Fisheries.

The quarterly meeting of the Board of Trade last night was more than ordinarily interesting. Besides prominent citizens nearly all the members of the Legislature were present.

during the past two years has been revived to some extent. On the North Shore the herring is not plentiful in summer though more are to be found in spring and fall.

Mr. Tidmarsh, thought that the organization of a fleet operating from Georgetown or other Island ports was not practicable with the capital available in the province. He outlined the founding of the fisher population in the New England States and said that they were under much different conditions from our population here.

Speaking of the beam trawler Mr. Tidmarsh said it had been tried here but the sea bottom was too rocky. In reference to lobster traps frightening the mackerel he could not give an opinion. The lobster spawn, he thought was food for the mackerel. The bait thrown out in past years had attracted them and later the pure selge had driven them away.

John McLennan, Souris, agreed with much the last speaker had said. He did not agree with Mr. Tidmarsh as to the value of the herring huddle fisheries but in herring fishing there might be great success.

A J. McDonald endorsed what Mr. Tidmarsh had said of the cause of the mackerel leaving. The lobster spawn had been the food of the mackerel. The lobsters had been depleted and the mackerel had eaten their young.

Hon. Peter McNutt said the Local Government had been pressing for a settlement of the dispute over oyster fields for some years and now a case had been laid for the Supreme Court. We have grand fisheries and we want men who are constant at the oyster industry could be greatly improved.

After further discussion a vote of thanks to Mr. Tidmarsh moved by Hon. Mr. Hughes and seconded by J. A. M. Henson, and supported by Cap. Read, was carried unanimously, and the meeting adjourned.

A GREAT NAVAL BATTLE GOING ON

Russian Battleship Petropaulovski Sent to the Bottom with 700 Men, Blown up by Russian Mine—Admiral Makaroff Drowned or a Prisoner—Twenty Russians Killed near Wiju.

RUSSIAN BATTLESHIP'S FATE. ST. PETERSBURG, April 13—(Special)—The city is full of rumors of the destruction of the first-class battleship Petropaulovski at Port Arthur.

A GREAT RUSSIAN ADMIRAL. Admiral Makaroff, the most noted of Russian naval commanders was born in 1818, and rose to the top by distinguished services in all the Russian wars since 1864. He designed and had constructed in England the famous ice breaking steamer Ermack, in which he made two expeditions to the Arctic seas.

IT IS NOT definitely known whether the ship was destroyed in battle or by striking a Russian mine, but the latter is believed to be what happened.

Latest advices declare that the warship was making her way out of the harbor to meet the Japanese fleet, struck the mine, turned over and sank with practically the whole crew lost.

NEARLY ALL PERISHED. It is said that nearly all on board perished, only four officers being saved. One of these was the Grand Duke Cyril, who was wounded.

It is said a naval battle is still proceeding off Port Arthur. This is confirmed from English and other sources.

MAKEROFF DROWNED OR PRISONER. Admiral Makaroff is supposed to be drowned, but one report declares he was taken prisoner.
