Precedence List High For Wedding

LONDON — Contrary to first expectations, it now appears the Lieut.-Governors and Premiers of the various provinces of Canada will not be invited to the Royal wedding of Princess Elizabeth and Lieut. Philip Mountbatten in November.

Gift From E. C. T. It is learned in official quarters here that the Government of British Columbia has enquired through the proper channels if a wedding present from the people of Canada's most western province would be acceptable to Her Royal Highness.

Only a handful of Canadians, those at the very top of the official precedence list, will be invited to the wedding. The Prime Minister has already been asked to attend. His invitation went by cable, and he accepted. The Governor-General of Canada is expected to be present.

Simply Invited There the invitations will have to stop. Lieut.-Governors of the provinces rank after the Federal cabinet ministers. Until a few years ago they followed in precedence the Governor-General.

The wedding will be comparatively simple for a Royal affair and it would be impossible to invite guests from Canada without having them to the wedding breakfast in Buckingham Palace.

Canadian Lieut.-Governors and Premiers were invited. It would also be necessary to invite the Lieut.-Governors and Premiers from all the other British Commonwealth countries.

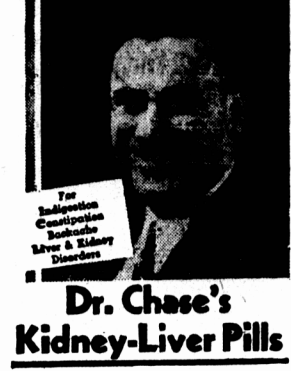
Estimate 20 Million Suffer From Syphilis

GENEVA, Sept. 30 — (AP) — At least 20,000,000 persons over the world suffer from syphilis, a worldwide review of venereal disease problems prepared by the Secretariat of the World Health Organization reports.

The main author of the report, Dr. Thorstein Guthe of Norway, describes this figure as "conservative" and estimates that the true prevalence of syphilis throughout the world, including the most backward areas of Asia and Africa, is "probably 10 times as large."

The report urged revision of the 1926 Brussels agreement of 1926 for the treatment of venereal disease in merchant seamen and called for special national and international programs.

Princess Turns Up Nose At Long Skirts

(By The Canadian Press) LONDON, Sept. 29 — Princess Elizabeth turned up her nose at long skirts.

She made her first public appearance here since the long-skirt fashion took hold, and she chose a suit with a skirt just covering the knees.

The Princess, ending a seven-week stay at Balmoral Castle in Scotland, came home to get on with preparations for her wedding to Lieut. Philip Mountbatten Nov. 20.

The new colors range from indigo (a deep green), princess blue (a pastel shade), and spit-head blue (light navy blue).

While details of the gown remained secret, an announcement at Buckingham Palace disclosed it will have a train. Silk for the train will be provided by the silk farm at Lullingstone Castle at Eynsford, in Kent.

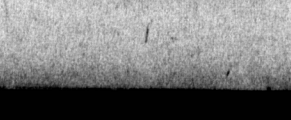
In fact the by-laws prescribe almost a complete code of conduct. A cabbie can't smoke, use abusive or insulting language, and must not "at any place station, steamboat wharf, place of amusement or other public place conduct himself in a noisy or disorderly manner."

No solicitation of passengers can be made by "calling out or shouting in any other noisy or disorderly manner." And he has to allow five minutes' grace for passengers while making calls.

The rules don't stop there. Cabbies must remain in or near their vehicles while awaiting fares and not stray therefrom or form into groups.

Even when he has got rid of a fare, the driver's job isn't finished. He must search his vehicle for any property lost or left behind by his passenger and deliver it or turn it over to police.
