Sir—Your reasonable remarks about the Old Age Pension Act of the Dominion Parliament must convince every reader that I have ever well intended the Act will operate fairly as between the Provinces and the Dominion. If we are to have an old Age Pension Act let it be so changed that the Dominion pay the share of the Old Age Pension that ought to be paid to the old people of Canada who are not fairly and equitably provided for if their pensions are drawn from the one treasury, to which the people of all Canada contribute. To make the Dominion pay the Old Age Pension is to make the Dominion pay the Old Age Pension of the old people of British Columbia, as it has to do now is not fair—is, indeed, outrageous.

INCIDENTAL LESSONS OF THE FIRST CHRISTMAS

There is a tradition that these shepherds were a special class who kept the sheep destined for sacrifice in the Temple. But it is not necessary to think that for any such reason they were honored above all other shepherds. The occupation of the shepherd was a school of devotion. The stillness and solitude of the night was favorable to pious thoughts. These rustic magi were praying for the Messiah. The prepared message came to prepared mind. Great are the rewards of communion with the Infinite!

God meets men on their own plane. The thought of angels was familiar to these shepherds. God sent them an angel. The Magi on the other hand were star-gazers. God sent them a star. But the Magi lost their star when they turned toward Jerusalem under the supposition that a king must needs be born in a capitol. That might be a clue to the finding of an earthly king. It was none to the finding of the King of Heaven.

The Magi were not offended at finding the object of their search in a stable. No one today need be offended if he finds Jesus under humble conditions, under guidance of some unlettered peasant or in some conventicle rather than in a mitered prelate in a cathedral.

The shepherds gave immediate attention to their heavenly visitor. They sprang to their feet saying "Let's go and see the thing the Lord has told us of!" A like persistence today would not fall of its reward. Too often men touch the circumstances of great experience only to fly off at a tangent in business or pleasure. A strike for the center should be made. "Stay there!" should be the command to all diverting affairs. The matter should be thought to a finish. From such a finish one may return rewarded as the shepherds were.

"The shepherds returned." How could they? After listening to the angel's song how could they come down to the hum-drum of keeping sheep? But they did! There is nothing incompatible between religion and every-day tasks.

The object of the appearance of the angels to the shepherds was to make them witnesses. They proved faithful. They filled the whole region with their testimony. Their evidence was used afterwards to prove that Jesus was born in Bethlehem and declared to be the "Christ of God."

There is a personal as well as a general Advent, a heavenly announcement to the individual soul of the immanence of God. Such a message reasonably deserves investigation. The shepherd-like obedience which "ages ago" met every faith's reward. Christ is born in the "center of hope of glory and he returns glorifying and praising God."

LONGEVITY

Sir—According to the records men and women are living longer than they did in ye olden time. The Psalmist placed the limit of human life at eighty years, but now we frequently see Octogenarians on our streets quite lively; and the death notices in the paper show how to grow old and die. The men pass to the Great Beyond at the age of ninety and a hundred years. Some of the scientists now say that man may live to the age of a hundred and fifty years and more. Temperance and economy, with more knowledge about the laws of life may, indeed, result in longer life, and now that there are to be old age pensions and no worry at the end of life, the average of the age of men and women will doubtless be increased. To know how to grow old and die is the master-work of wisdom and one of the most difficult chapters in the great art of living. Old Age especially an honoured old age is especially another great authority of "of more value than all the pleasures of youth."

At any rate old as well as young may enjoy, each in their own way, the pleasure of this Christmas season and look forward to the hope found in the birth of the Prince of Peace.

Elizabeth Harriet, wife of James Essery, Kensington, died at her home on Thursday, December 14th, after having sustained for a protracted period, the affliction of a serious accident. She carried her cross with Christian fortitude and laid it down to receive the crown that is won by the meritorious deeds of a dutiful wife.

Mrs. Essery was the daughter of the late William Harriet and Mary Rude, his wife, who were natives of Devonshire, England. Emigrating early in life they came to this country and settled in Cornwall, P. E. I. They engaged in agricultural pursuits, in which they were eminently successful. She was in 1873, married to Mr. James Essery in Charlottetown, and for a while, lived at North River.

When the Prince Edward Island Railway was in building, Mr. Essery most satisfactorily served with the company as Track Repairer. When the trunk line was taken over by the Dominion Government the valuable services of Mr. Essery were retained. In the capacity of Section Foreman, Mr. Essery worked forty-two years for the Government. In all the vicissitudes Mr. Essery found in his beloved wife, a true and devoted co-worker, she watched with zealous care, his advancement from year to year, in the Railway service, and finally saw him conclude his experience in this branch of public utility, as Foreman of the Kensington section.

Mrs. Essery was an ideal wife, always securing his wants and comfort before her own, an indulgent and practical mother, ever having the care of her family at heart, and continually planning for the happiness of the home. This Lockhart, she conceived as her first duty; then she bestowed willing care on the welfare of the community. A zealous comforter of the sick was sympathy extended to the bereaved, bearing the solace of charitable consolation to the sick bed-ridden family.
