Dr. McDonald, the Member for Souris, in seconding the address in reply to the speech from the Throne, referred to the deep significance of the advent of the new Governor-General to the shores of Canada.

It was for the Maritime Provinces thirty years ago.

MR. BELL SPEAKS.
