SUBMARINED CREW REACHED BOSTON

BOSTON, August 14.—The crew of the Swedish steamer Sydland, which was sunk by a German submarine on August 8, southeast of Nanucket, has been landed at this port. The Germans, in sinking the neutral ship, proceeded in a leisurely manner, spending three or four hours in examining the paper, in exploring her holds and in making ready the bombs which finally sank her, according to the story told by the officers. The Sydland was bound in ballast from Gothenburg, Sweden, to Hampton Roads for orders.

TWO SOLDIERS ARE SHOT AND KILLED AT LEVIS CAMP

QUEBEC, Aug. 13.—Henri Vidal, a French-Armenian, recently enrolled in a Serbian detachment camped at Lauzon, Levis, and a Serbian soldier, Ciro Dubrodja, are dead as the result of a shooting affray which occurred this evening, the whole town of Lauzon being aroused by the shooting which caused much excitement there. According to what can be gathered, Vidal was the aggressor. He was returning to camp after a visit to Quebec, apparently under the influence of liquor. He was stopped by two sentries who demanded his pass and after a little discussion, Vidal drew a revolver and shot one of the sentries, Dubrodja, killing him instantly. He then turned his gun on the other man but missed, the sentry then firing four shots into Vidal's body, every one taking effect. Vidal died about fifteen minutes later.
