THE reputation of the busy town of Amherst N. S. is being well maintained throughout the summer. Tweeds, cars, engines, furnaces, steam boilers, boots shoes, trunks, caskets, valves, building material, fine cabinet work, packed meats, &c &c continue to roll away in train loads from its busy freight yards, and times are booming in this town on the edge of the great Transmarra marshes.

A Guardian representative met C. O. Thompson, who sells Hewson Tweeds, and he says his firm is reaping a large harvest of good business as a result of long devotion to the principle of making pure, honest tweeds, and using no shoddy or cotton to cheapen the price or lower their high standard. Questioned as to the reason Mr. Thompson said that nothing but the greatest care in manufacturing and designing enables them to supply the critical demands of the foreign trade. The same care is exercised in dealing with the home trade which largely accounts for the great popularity of Hewson Tweeds.

THERE were a number of cases before the Police Court yesterday. Della McKenna was the first called. After the evidence for the plaintiff which was convicting, Mr. Mellish, the counsel, took the stand. He swore he was acquainted with the defendant who lives at the place known as the Buck and Wig. She lives with her father and mother and some small children. He asked that the case be thrown out, as the case in which the woman Catherine McKenna was previously convicted was on the same dates as the present one. The magistrate held that the mother and the daughter had each made sales and were each liable. The defendant was fined \$100 and costs or three months imprisonment. George Offer was convicted of a third offence and sentenced to six months imprisonment. George, however, has followed other illustrious Charlottetownians and trekked to Picton where he will probably locate. W. A. Weeks jr. did not appear for the defendant but after judgment was given intimated that the defendant was absent from the province at the time of the serving of the summons. The magistrate over-ruled the objection holding that evidence to the fact of his absence should have been laid before the Court. Augustus Es'worth was fined \$100 and costs for first offence. Mr Weeks objected because of overlapping information. The case against Sarah Jane Higgins was adjourned for one week. In the Ellsworth and Offer cases Mr Weeks gave notice of certiorari. Seymour Gregory drunk and incapable was fined \$5 or thirty days.

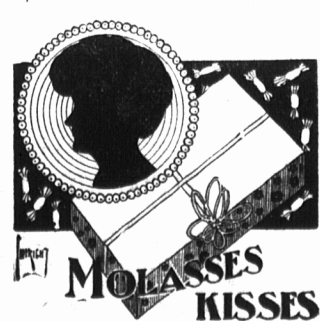
