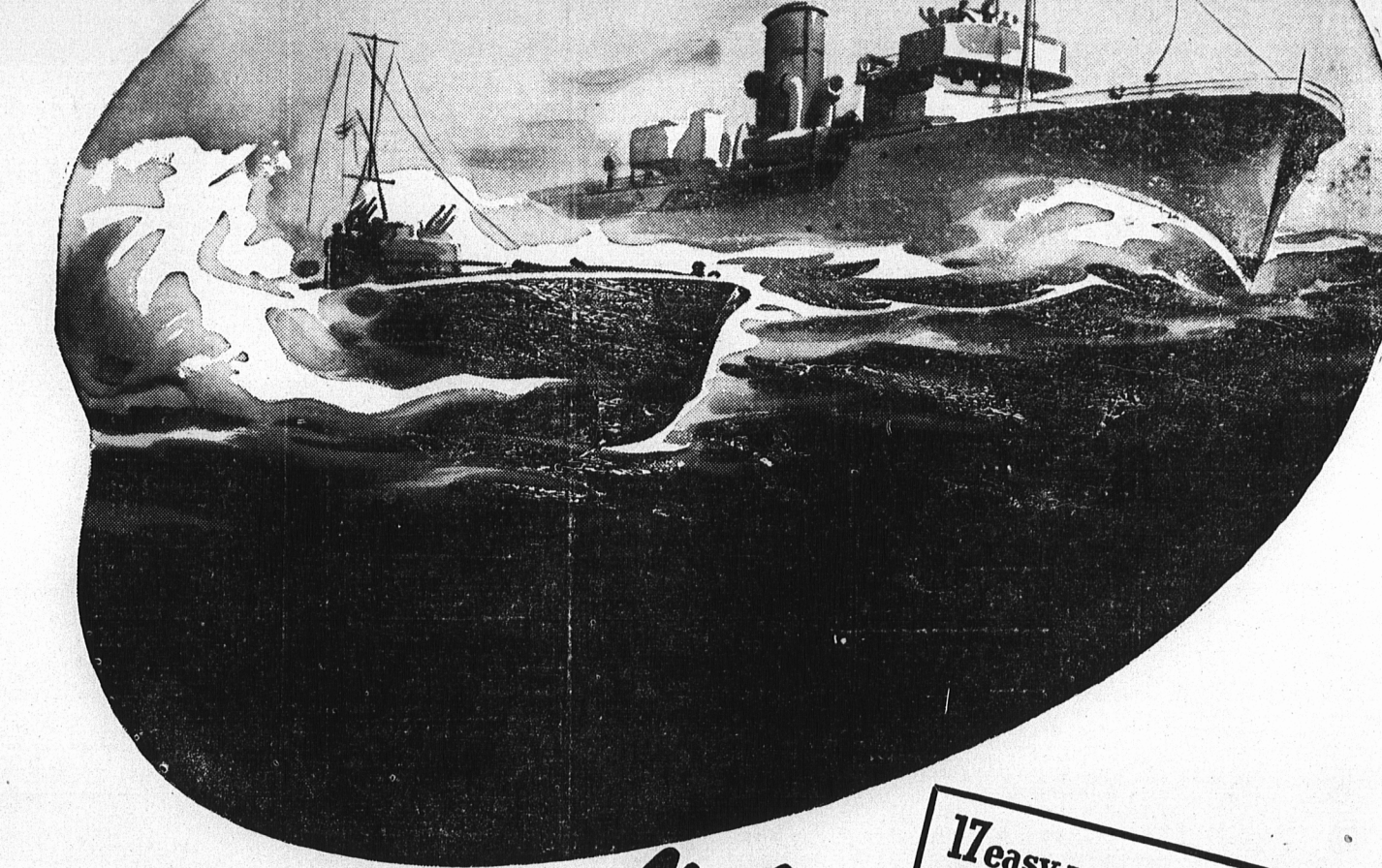
Toronto Exchange

CHICAGO, July 31—(AP)—After fluctuating irregularly most of the session, wheat prices turned definitely lower today and closed near the low point of the season although net losses amounted to less than a cent a bushel.

Wheat closed 1-8-5-8 lower, Sept. 1.06, Dec. 1.08 1-8-1-4; corn 1-8-1-4 off, Sept. 74 7-8-75; oats 1-4-1-2 down.

WINNIPEG, July 31—(CP)—Only minor trades took place in the wheat pit today and bulk of the activity on Winnipeg grain exchange was made up of evening-up trades. Prices closed 5-8 lower, with July wheat at 72 1-2, October 74 1-8 and December 75 3-4 cents a bushel.

Coarse grains were generally lower on scattered liquidation. Malsters support was restricted in barley as prices fell off and there was a suggestion of mill buying in oats. Flax was irregular, while rye trades were unimportant.
