

# Crystals Take Abegweits Into Camp 4-2 Wolverines Defeat Chevrolets 3 to 1

## Crystals 4 Abegweits 2

Local Show The Way In First Period, To Weaken In Second And Wilt In Third, When Offensive Meant Goals.

Abegweits, out-generated, but not outplayed, suffered a 4 to 2 defeat at the hands of the Crystal hockey team last night in the first game of a two-game series, goals to count, for second sectional honors in the Prince Edward Island Hockey League.

The Abegweits, leaving by special train at 5:30 this evening for Summerside, are conceded less than an even chance of coming through against Roy Prowse's band of puck-chasers. A three to nothing defeat by Abegweits is necessary for a twin-bill win and a qualification for a play-off in tonight's game.

Abegweits will leave this evening, however, with determination and confidence, that they can yet overcome a three goal lead to clinch the play-off verdict.

Speaking about last night's set-to, it looked as though the homesters were coming across with a win by at least a goal to the good, but fast and steady work on the part of the visitors, supplemented by the excellent net-minding of Collings turned the Abegweits back to a scoreless count.

In the second period Crystals took a lease of life on the whistle face-off, by showing an offensive that not only made the fans sit up but forced McEwen in the Abble goal to bend for an opening score, "Chick" Gallant realizing in three minutes from right wing.

On the score the Abble front line was intact, and going pretty, Gordon finally evening the count on Blanchard's rebound. The latter, playing a whole of a game should have been used more often.

On this score, McLellan, Saunders and Prowse were "yanked" for a rest,

but during said respite, Crystals, throwing their entire lineup into the fray, scored two goals in three minutes, Silliphant netting on a pass from Schurman, and Gallant doing the same job on a pass from Silliphant. On the completion of the last counting play, Abegweits started a real offensive but to no avail. The Crystals were there and playing hockey par excellence.

The third period started off in glowing fashion, and the hopes of the home fans were raised somewhat when Gallant and Montgomery were "chased" to the pen, but there's always a slip, and Schurman grabbed the proverbial loose puck to score with two of his team-mates doing time. A four-man offensive previous to this goal would have undoubtedly played havoc with the visiting sextette.

Abegweits, undismayed and at the same time undamned continued to bore in, four men up, in the last moments of the game, Gordon dropping the last score of the night on a rebound off Saunders' stick; it was a great goal and a cleverly executed play. There was no further scoring and Crystals were returned the victors 4 to 2 and two goals to the good on home ice tonight.

Few penalties were handed out, Crystals being awarded the long end of five to Abegweits three.

## AILING SOUP BONES CURED

If early baseball rumors can be accepted as fact, some of the world's best baseball fingers who suffered last year from ailing soup-bones will be back on the firing line this season to make life miserable for the fellows who are anxious to pile up percentages in the hit column.

Two of these fellows do their salary grabbing with the New York Yankees, while another used to be quite a help to the Pittsburgh Pirates before a sudden collapse removed him from the class of consistent winners.

Herb Pennock, the left-handed ace of the Yanks, who passed out of the picture in mid-August last year, due to a bad case of neuritis, has reported that all traces of his ailment have disappeared and that he will be taking his regular turn on the mound when the rapidly approaching season gets under way. This news is cause for extra cheering from the Yankee headquarters, but it's pepper in the eye for the opposing batsmen in the American League. Pennock is a mainstay on the New York twirling staff and while he modestly admits that he wasn't needed by the Yankees at the finish last year, the boys on the club will tell you that the heaviest burden the team had to bear on its trudge toward the pennant was Herb's dis-

ability. Pennock is one of those pitchers who figures to win every time he starts, no matter who is opposing him on the mound, or who is rushed in to do pinch hitting in the ninth inning when a run or two may mean defeat for the Yankees. It has been said of Pennock that any time he loses it's an upset and that's considerable compliment.

Another ray of sunshine filtered into the Yankee headquarters through the towering skyscrapers of the metropolis when a letter from Hollis, Okla., announced that Wilcy Moore, the well-known relief finger of the New York club, would be back due to a bad case of neuritis. The "sinker" ball artist, who was instrumental in pitching the Yanks to a pennant and a World Series victory in 1927, was on the shelf most of last season and did little to offset the \$10,000 paid him by the Yanks. Cy has been wintering at Hollis, where he does gentleman farming and is the leader of the Volunteer Fire Department. He has been nursing the salary wind, but he wasn't willing to admit until just recently that he felt fit again and that he was quite sure that he could again fool the hitters in the American League.

Lee Meadows, the bespectacled veteran of many wars is the fellow who

may bring joy to the Pittsburgh Pirates. Meadows, who has gained a rep as a winning flinger, had a sudden collapse last summer and was kept out of all but four games during the season. At first his trouble was diagnosed as sinus trouble and later it was all blamed on neuritis. When he found that he could not take his regular turn on the hill he asked to be placed on the voluntary retired list. Barney Dreyfuss placed him there and Lee took his spectacles and went to Florida, where he barked out in the warm sun for several months. Now he says that he is as fit as a fiddle once more and he hopes to give the old soup-bone a real workout during Spring training in California, and is confident that he will be able to go when the curtain lifts. Lee is a great early Spring winner, and he usually gets away with a string of victories right off the bat and still has enough left in midseason to hold his own with the best in the league.

It is not at all certain that Lee will be back in harness this season, but the fans all hope so.

Pennock and Moore have thrilled a lot of fans over the country by their pitching, and the boys in the bleachers will be glad to hear that they will probably be on the firing line again this year.
