—Miss Hazel Crockett, who has been visiting her home in Summerside left yesterday to spend the holidays at Woodstock, N. B.

—An entertainment and Xmas tree will be held in Epworth Hall on Tuesday evening next. A small admission fee will be charged.

—Miss Clara Stein of St. John's, Nfld., a student at Edgehill is spending the Xmas holidays in Summerside the guest of Mrs. C. R. Rogers.

—The December term of the County Court, for the fifth circuit, Judge McLeod presiding, opened in Summerside yesterday. There was a fairly large docket of cases. Court adjourned till Tuesday morning.

—On Tuesday, Dec. 20th, a large meeting of fishermen and lobster packers assembled in Mt. Carmel Hall for the purpose of discussing the new regulations regarding lobster fishing. J. J. T. Richard being appointed chairman. J. J. Gallant explained the object of the meeting. Strong views were given by J. B. G. Arsenault, L. R. Poirier, Jerome Richard and others. J. B. G. Arsenault and J. J. T. Richard being named as delegates to attend a meeting in Charlottetown, the following propositions were unanimously adopted by the meeting. 1st. That they are of opinion that the season of fishing should not be changed. 2nd. That the laths should be no more than one inch apart. 3rd. That the parlor trap should be maintained. 4th. That the meshes on heads of traps be no more than 2 inches. 5th. That all old gear should be taken ashore. 6th. That they are disposed and willing to abide by the law forbidding to land any female lobster carrying spawns. This being the only natural way of preserving the lobster industry.

—The death occurred at Saranac Lakes, N. Y., on the 13th inst., of Aretis McLean, son of John McLean of Ellis River, Lot 16. In March last deceased was suddenly taken ill of hemorrhages of a serious nature and acting on the advice of his physician went to Muskoka Sanitarium where he spent some six or seven months. From there he proceeded to the Saranac Lakes where he improved slightly but about a month ago the hemorrhages returned and he gradually grew worse until the end came. His brother W. A. McLean had been telegraphed for but did not arrive until deceased had passed away. He at once started on the return journey with the remains, arriving home on Saturday last. Deceased was twenty-three years of age and of exemplary character, quiet, kind, thoughtful and unassuming and in every sense of the word a friend to all his acquaintances. He had travelled quite extensively having spent some years in the western part of the U. S. A. He leaves to mourn his father, one brother Wm. A. of North Bedouque, and one sister Mrs. Arthur McKinnon, Glenondale, Tracadie. The funeral took place Sunday afternoon and was largely attended. The services were conducted by Rev. W. A. Mason. The pall bearers were Russell Umeron, John Campbell, James McAn, Robert Yeo, Roy McLean and Y. Burns.

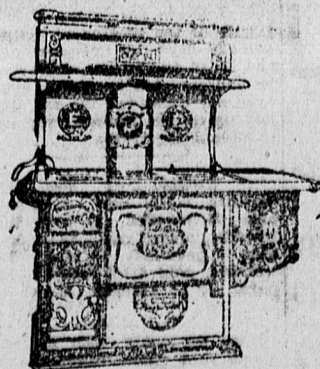
