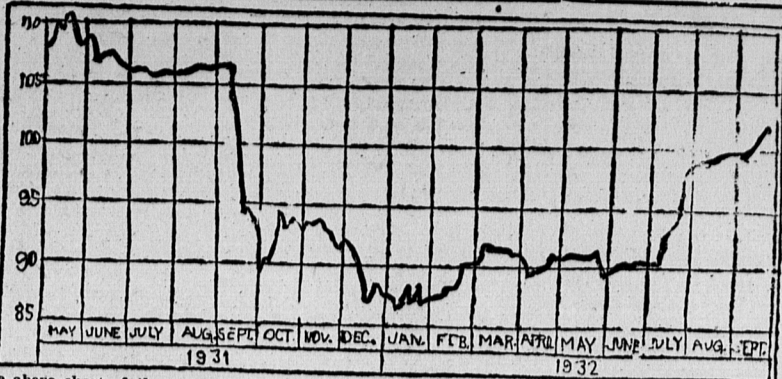

ELECTRICAL MEN MEET — A meeting of the Electrical Association was held last evening in the City Hall Annex with the president, Mr. James Brown, in the chair. The meeting followed an adjourned meeting held last month at Summerside. Various matters having to do with organization work were discussed. An enrollment of forty members was reported. An objective of uniting all electrical organizations in the Province has been decided upon.

Cadet Signalling Courses — Cadet Signalling Courses are to commence in Charlottetown, Summerside and Kensington during the first week in November, according to an announcement made by Headquarters of Military District No. 6 at Halifax. Each course will continue for about seven weeks with classes meeting on three afternoons a week, after school hours, and will terminate with an examination. At Charlottetown instruction will be given in Morse and Semaphore; the required standard for successful candidates being reading and sending five words a minute in Morse and six in Semaphore. This course is open to approximately fifteen cadets from each of St. Dunstan's, Prince of Wales, West Kent and Queen Square Corps. At Summerside and Kensington the courses will be of the same duration, but instruction will be given only in the Semaphore Code. Attendance at Summerside will be limited to forty or fifty candidates, while at Kensington the course will be available for all members of the Corps. Successful candidates receive a certificate and in addition a percentage of the best signalers in each course will receive a bonus of \$2.00.

Predicts Alta. Oil For Empire
(Special to The Guardian)
CALGARY, Oct. 7.—In the near future enough crude oil will be produced in Alberta between Keho Lake and the international boundary to supply the British Empire, according to Arthur I. Davis, consulting geologist and petroleum engineer of the Wilshire Oil Company of California, now visiting Alberta's oil district. Mr. Davis believes oil gushers will be discovered that will "stagger the imaginations of Albertans."
C. A. Roney, Los Angeles oil operator, who accompanied Mr. Davis, plans to drill a well at Twin River, 25 miles west of Milk River town the property of the Nordon Corporation where, Mr. Davis predicts, 1,000 to 10,000 barrels daily will be produced. He places a \$100,000,000 value on the property.

The League of Nations

OPENING OF THE LEAGUE COUNCIL

GENEVA, Sept. 23.—The League of Nations Council commenced its sixty-eighth session here today, under the presidency of Mr. Eamon de Valera, President of the Irish Free State Executive Council. No more striking evidence could be offered of the conciliatory influence exercised by the League in world affairs.

On Mr. de Valera's right sat the British secretary-general of the League, Sir Eric Drummond, and next in order at the big horseshoe table in the Council chamber was Sir John Simon, representative of the British Government, which Mr. de Valera has so long and vigorously fought.
The Irish leader's presence in the chair is expected to add piquance to the forthcoming debates. Should he choose to intervene in the discussions of such questions as the Manchurian situation, termination of the British mandate in Iraq, establishment of foreign control in Liberia and suppression of slavery where it still exists, his contributions to the debates may well give rise to a dramatic situation.

The most important question on the Council agenda is the Lytton report on Manchuria. The Japanese Government has requested the Council to postpone discussion of this report until the middle of November and it appears this request will be complied with.
Publication of the report will not be so long delayed. In fact, it is in hand. The document, comprising 400 typewritten pages with annexes totalling more than 1500 pages, reached Geneva yesterday, and is being translated from English into French, and will be printed and circulated about Oct. 5.

The Japanese are apprehensive of its contents although it is understood the document does not openly accuse Japan of "aggression." Judging from the latest appeal addressed by the Chinese Government to the League, it appears probable the report recognizes at least the nominal sovereignty of China over Manchuria.

The Chinese aver that the Japanese recognition of the independence of the state of Manchukuo has been hastened for the purpose of presenting the world with an accomplished fact before the Lytton text could become known.

THE ASSEMBLY

GENEVA, Sept. 26.—"Without progressive disarmament, it is almost impossible that the League of Nations should survive," declared Mr. Eamon de Valera, in opening the thirteenth regular session of the League Assembly here today.

The necessity of doing something definite in this field and in the World Economic Conference was emphasized also by Mr. Nicholas Politis, former Foreign Minister of Greece, who was elected president of the Assembly.

Mr. de Valera pointed out that there was much criticism of the League and a great popular demand for more actual accomplishment. For the first time referring in League circles to the Irish question, Mr. de Valera declared: "We in Ireland desire peace at home and throughout the world. If we are left free, our way will be the way of peace."

Mr. Politis was elected president on the first ballot by a big majority. His intimate connection with the League for many years, his general ability as a speaker and presiding officer and the desire to pay a gracious tribute to his country were determining factors in his election. In his opening remarks he recognized the serious problems which

The Assembly has now been resolved into its various committees which this year are five in number, the one on disarmament having been eliminated as its functions are being performed by the Disarmament Conference.

LEAGUE SECRETARY RESIGNS

GENEVA, Sept. 27.—Sir Eric Drummond's resignation as Secretary of the League of Nations was accepted today by the League Council. It will take effect early in 1933, the date not definitely specified.

Sir Eric submitted the resignation some time ago for action at this session. Mr. Joseph Avenol, the Deputy Secretary-General, appears to be the natural successor, but this matter awaits discussion by the League Assembly.
