Egg Laying Contest

NOTES ON THE SIXTH P. E. I. EGG LAYING CONTEST FOR THE 13TH WEEK END. BEGINNING JANUARY 30 TH. 1924

Owing to the great variations in temperature during the past week, many birds in the P. E. I. Egg Laying Contest suffered a loss in egg production, as well as having their combs slightly frozen. This was especially noted in the Leghorns, which have been laying well since the Contest started in November. The heavier breeds due to late maturing are just starting to lay. During the week 548 eggs were laid compared with 589 for the previous week. 4501 eggs have been laid to date.

Experimental Station's pen of White Leghorns leads the Contest for the week with 46 eggs. Experimental Station's pen No. 13 second with 41 eggs. Experimental Station's pen of White Leghorns No. 12 third with 38 eggs. Mr. Augustus Wisner's White Wyandottes fourth with 35 eggs. Experimental Station's pen of White Leghorns No. 13 fifth with 34 eggs. Experimental Station's pen of Barred Rocks No. 19 sixth with 33 eggs. Mr. D. F. MacDonald's Barred Rocks tied for seventh with Mrs. Fred McIntyre's White Leghorns with 32 eggs each and Mr. J. J. McGillivray's White Leghorns eighth with 29 eggs.

Experimental Station's pen of White Leghorns No. 14 leads the Contest to date with 384 eggs. Experimental Station's pen of White Leghorns No. 12 second with 370 eggs. Experimental Station's pen of White Leghorns No. 13 third with 364 eggs. Mr. Sam McPherson's White Leghorns fourth with 326. Mr. Edward Bullpitt's White Leghorns fifth with 323 eggs. Mr. J. J. McGillivray's White Leghorns sixth with 315 eggs. Experimental Station's pen of White Leghorns No. 15 seventh with 311 eggs, and Mr. Evert Howatt's White Leghorns eighth with 286 eggs.

Canadians in London

THE CANADIAN HIGH COMMISSIONER'S OFFICE IN LONDON WEEK BY WEEK

During the week ending January 16th, 211 visitors called at the Canadian Office, of whom 158 obtained interviews and 53 registered.

The question of the status of the High Commissioner of the Dominion of Dominions is now being considered by the Government.

The British Government's proposal to hold a great Empire Pageant at the British Empire Exhibition at Wembley, during July and August, in which the Dominions and India should take part has been exciting the attention of the Dominion Representatives in London who are considering the possibility of staging incidents to portray some of the features of present day life.

The British Government hopes that it may be possible to arrange for the Pageant to be repeated twelve times or thirty-six performances altogether as each performance will be spread over three days. At the request of the Canadian High Commissioner definite proposals will be shortly submitted to him to be forwarded to the Canadian Government for their consideration.

The matter of the difference between ocean rates on Canadian goods compared with the charges made for wheat is considered by the High Commissioner for Canada to be out of proportion and he has asked the Imperial Shipping Committee to take the matter up at the next meeting.

The co-operation of the High Commissioners for the Dominions has been sought by the British Board of Education in connection with their intention to encourage organized visits of school children to the British Empire Exhibition at Wembley. It is suggested that literature shall be supplied, both for reference and distribution purposes. The Canadian Exhibition Commissioner has undertaken to have experts at points of interest within the Exhibition. These experts will be able to give information regarding Canadian exhibits and the places from which they come.

The High Commissioner and Mrs. Miss Larkin attended the ceremony of the opening of Parliament on Tuesday last, Mrs. Larkin and Miss Larkin being in the Peeresses Gallery.

An enquiry has been received as to the possibility of the Canadian Government granting a long lease to a syndicate to exploit the natural resources and especially Minerals of the North West Territories. It is also suggested that an Air Service might be established between Canada and the Far East.

Colonel Carnegie has handed to the High Commissioner a draft Treaty which he has prepared on the regulations of the manufacture by private enterprise of munitions and implements of war. This subject is on the agenda of the Meeting of the Temporary Mixed Commission for the Regulation of Armaments in Geneva early in February.

"WHY MANY DRINKING MEN WOULD PROHIBIT SALOONS."

In a concert hall in the city of Buffalo, Kipling saw two young men get two young girls drunk and lead them reeling down a dark street. Mr. Rudyard Kipling the famous moralist, has not been a total abstainer nor have his writings commended temperance, but that scene he writes of in his recent previous opinions, it became a prohibitionist. Better it be that a man should go without his beer in public places, and content himself with swearing at the narrow-mindedness of the majority; better it is to poison the inside with very vile temperance drinks, and to buy lager furiously at boot doors, than to bring temptation to the lips of young fools as the four I had seen. I understand now why the preachers rage against drink. I have said: "There is no harm in it, taken moderately; and yet my own demand for beer helped directly to send these two girls reeling down the dark streety to—God alone knows what end. If liquor is worth drinking, it is worth taking a little trouble to come at—such as a man will undergo to compass his own desires. It is not good that we should let it lie before the eyes of a child, and I have been a fool in writing to the contrary."

Hunted With Livingstone

LONDON, Feb. 1.—Mokwati, a native centurion of Ngamiland can give many interesting reminiscences of Doctor Livingstone, the great missionary.

Old Mokwati, has a very clear memory. Mokwati clearly remembers the arrival of the "Naka"—Dr. Livingstone.

Mokwati must have then been about 30. Amongst other recollections of the "Naka," he says that a large stow lion cub as a pet which was left on a chain.

This lion used to lick Livingstone's hand, but growl at any other person who came near it. There was also a small baby elephant.

Mokwati constantly went fishing and hippo hunting with Livingstone.

Capt. Stigand who has just returned from a visit to Ngamiland has some exciting experiences. "My Flottilla," he told your representative "consisted of an aluminum boat and two well-made native dug-out canoes. Travelling up the Ngoma River one of the craft escaped the attention of the hippo. One canoe was captured, and the other sunk.

"Finally, the boat was torpedoed, but fortunately the holes were plugged with rags, in each case the offending hippo attacked and exposed itself to a shot.

Upon hunting in the swampy region I came across a lion who had developed aquatic habits.

"At night he swam from islet to islet, through seven or eight feet deep water, stalking leeches on one islet after another in turn, roaring at intervals each time on a different islet."

"THIRTY DAYS DRV."

"In a month, if Manitoba would stop drinking intoxicants, it would have to its credit a saving at least of \$208,000.

A number of schools in Manitoba are closed to-day for lack of funds. The money saved on liquor would keep 170 schools going for six months and pay each teacher \$200 a month.

Recently the Agricultural agents who have been doing splendid work for years past at a number of rural points were dismissed because funds were no longer available to pay them. A liquor tax would provide money enough to place one in each of 40 provincial constituencies paying him \$3,000 a year and leaving \$2,200 for the expense of local agricultural classes under his care.

There are 300 local communities in Manitoba that need a public hall for community purposes. A month's abstinance from liquor would provide money to build 25 very serviceable halls and in six months the whole province would be equipped.

There are 50 towns in Manitoba that need a public library. A month's liquor cost would provide a permanent building and supply them each with 1,200 good books. In six months complete equipment could be provided.

There are at least 600 points in the province that ought to have 5 University Extension lectures every month. That would take 25 men working hard from September to April. But a month's liquor cost would provide them giving each \$4,000 salary, \$3,000 as travelling expenses and an extra \$1,000 for lantern or other equipment."

Testing The Wembley Stadium

LONDON, Feb. 1.—War Office gunnery experts, actresses, band conductors, and other special lists in sounds and noises assembled in the Stadium of the British Empire Exhibition at Wembley a few days ago to test its acoustics.

Raised high above the northern tiers of seats were eight sound-amplifying transmitters connected to their portable source of power, a motor-lyre.

Mrs. Basil Gill, followed by her actor husband, quietly recited a few lines of poetry into the microphone. Every syllable was magnified in sound 5,000 times was distinctly heard at the other end of the Stadium. A highway man's ballad was "offered" by Mr. Owen Nares. His vibrant and resonant voice was particularly effective, but he was eclipsed by his small son Geoffrey, who in tones that, amplified, were loud and as clear as a bell, asked: "Mummy, can you hear me?"

Varying in weight from a few ounces to a pound, packages of an explosive substance were ignited in the centre of the Stadium, to acquaint the experts with the correct amount of (amplified) "thunder-powder" to be used in what are evidently going to be pageants of realism.
