TO PREVENT MOTH DAMAGE

Eggs Should be Removed Before Clothes are Stored. The various substances used to keep away moths such as tobacco, camphor, naphthalene cones or balls, tarred paper, and cedar chips, have no effect if the eggs are already present in the clothes. Entomologists therefore recommend a thorough beating, shaking and brushing of all articles likely to attract moths, before they are laid away for the summer. The brushing of garments is especially important in order to remove eggs which may have escaped notice. If the articles are quite free from eggs or larvae when laid away, the odor from the various repellents already mentioned or from cedar chests and wardrobes will serve to keep the moths away. This odor, however, lessens with age, so that the protection it affords is greatly decreased after a few years. For this reason when furs and other valuable garments are wrapped in tarred paper, these containers should be renewed every year or two.

There are said to be more than two million little openings in the skin of our bodies to serve as outlets for an equal number of sweat glands. The body contains more than two hundred bones. It is said that as much blood as is in the entire body passes through the heart every minute. In all the blood in the body goes in and out of the heart once every minute. The lung capacity of the average person is about 250 cubic inches, the size of a watermelon.

With every breath you inhale about two-thirds of a pint of fresh air and exhale an equal amount if you breathe normally. The stomach of the average adult person has a capacity of about five pints, and manufactures about nine pounds of gastric juice daily. There are over five hundred muscles in the body, all of which should be exercised daily to keep you in the best condition. The average adult human heart weighs from eight to twelve ounces, and it beats about 100,000 times every twenty-four hours.

After she had chosen she was crazy to see him in person, so when he came to seal the formal betrothal (a civil and religious ceremony at which the bride never presents) she begged his little sister, who had not yet assumed the charshaf, to go into the room and carelessly leave the door open. The child went in, but alas! forgot to leave the door open, and the impatient bride caught no glimpse of him who after that day was her legal husband. She did not see him until at the social ceremony weeks later he withdrew the veil from her blushing face. But they both immediately fell in love with each other and have been devoted ever since. So it would seem that the photograph guided her well.

Another of my friends was allowed to receive a courtship from her husband between the legal marriage and the social ceremony. He called on her in the months that intervened, reading with her and trying to become acquainted with her. But their marriage turned out sadly, so you never can tell.

Turkish girls seem to prepare themselves for marriage in the absence of lovers. They are wooed by dreams and sweet thoughts; their faces become tender and their voices cooling during the period when their parents are making inquiries for a suitable husband for them. But it does seem a pity that these pretty and charming girls should never experience in any degree that most delightful process of courtship. Perhaps when they emerge into the freer life that seemed preparing for them until the war arrested progress, that will be one of their gains.

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

This sole head of a family on any date over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions. (1) Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity. (2) In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. (3) Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after settling homestead patent; also 20 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions. (4) A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions. W. W. ENLISTMENTS IN CANADA

OTTAWA.—Total enlistments for the first two weeks of July were 2,166 as compared with 2,855 for the last half of June. The shadow of conscription which stimulated recruiting to some extent during the latter part of May and early in June, is apparently not having the same influence now. It may be noted, however, that the insistent call for farm labor and the fact that has been no special effort made to stimulate voluntary recruiting since the conscription policy was announced, explain to some extent at least the fall in recruits this month. A conscription now coming in may be credited to the drafts of men who have been enlisted in the Canadian colonies in the United States. Toronto military district headed the list for the past fortnight with 836 men. The Kingston district recruited 160 men; London district, 145; Montreal district, 229; Quebec district, 13; Maritime Provinces, 219; Manitoba, 228; Saskatchewan, 79; Alberta, 39, and British Columbia, 220.

HOW MANY STARS ARE THERE?

Man may never know how many stars there are. The best we can do is to figure on the number that can be seen with the largest telescopes which have been invented, for of course, you know there must be many millions of them which to us are invisible, says the Book of Wonders. We have counted the stars so far as we can see them; or, rather, astronomers have found that a photographic plate exposed to the stars will show more of them than can be seen by the naked eye. This is because the materials on a photographic plate are more sensitive to the light of the stars than the human eye. By this method man has been able in a way to count the stars he can see. It adds up to more than a hundred million out by taking photographs of the heavens at night, devoting one picture to each section, until the entire heavens had been covered, and then counting them.

HOUSEWIVES ENROL

Housewives throughout the United States are to be enrolled by the Government to aid in food conservation. The enrollment is to take place between July 1 and 15 according to plans announced by Herbert C. Hoover, America's Food Controller. Every woman in the country will be asked to sign a pledge to aid the Government by household sacrifices. Hundreds of millions of dollars will be saved by such national effort in the opinion of American authorities. Millions can be saved in Canada by the same means. Household economy, industrial economy, commercial economy—all these are required if the Dominion is to practise that measure of thrift which is required if the national resources of the country are to bear the increasing war burden. The Service Board is urging investment in War Savings Certificates, you are giving your money directly for war purposes. The fighting line must be supported by the financial line.
