favour of the proposal was that the city needed to put itself into the best possible condition for the forthcoming Confederation Celebration. 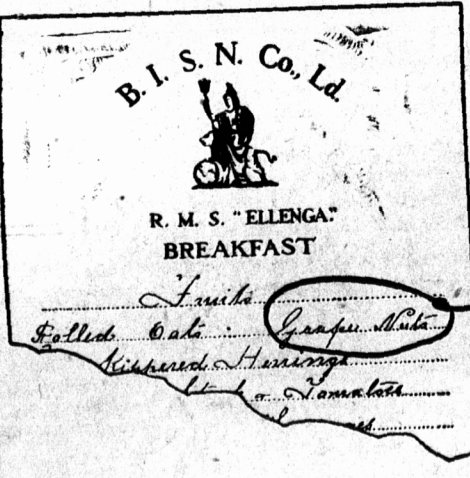
