Poland, which this summer is holding its second national Scout Jamboree, is the third strongest country in Boy Scouts.

DANISH SCOUTS 25th BIRTHDAY. The Danish Scout Association, or Det Danske Spejderkorps, is holding a 25th Anniversary National Scout Jamboree, July 27—August 9, near Copenhagen. As usual, Scouts from other countries are invited.

JUNIOR SCOUTS GROW RAPIDLY IN MANY COUNTRIES. In the British Empire and 35 other countries there was at the end of 1934 a total of 1,000,000 Scouts. The International Scout Bureau, 336-894 Wolf Cubs, or Junior Boy Scouts, Iceland reported 90, Iraq 2,070, Egypt 1,145, Japan 5,372. The total for the Empire was 264,108.

WOODCRAFT CALLS REPLACE BUGLES. When Scouting was less well understood bugles were a frequent item of troop equipment. For some years they have been "tabu" as "neighborhood nuisances" and because bird and wild animal calls are more consistent with woodcraft. Which explains why a Fort William man, seeking someone to sound a bugle, could not find a Scout who could blow one.

THE SCOUTS FOUND HER. It has become almost routine throughout Canada to "call out the Scouts" when persons are lost, and the number found in a year would make a fair-sized group. The latest case was the search by Gall, Ontario, Scouts for a four year old girl, when police and neighbors had failed, and her discovery in a remote corner of a large park at 10.30 p.m.

EUROPEAN POLITICS DO NOT AFFECT BOY SCOUTS. Indicating that the political differences of their elders mean little to them, Boy Scouts of Britain, Hungary, France, Spain, Belgium, Holland, Poland, Sweden, and other European countries are planning their usual exchange of camping and hiking visits this summer. Troops of English and Scottish Scouts will be camp guests in Denmark, Poland and Hungary and smaller units will visit other countries. Similar groups from these countries will visit England and Scotland.

The state legislature of Nevada has passed a bill raising the marriage license fee from \$2 to \$3. The extra \$1 is to go into the state's Boy Scout fund.

CANADIAN ROVERS TO VISIT SWEDEN. It is expected that a small party of Canadian Rover Scouts from different parts of the Dominion will attend the 2nd World Rover Moot to open near Copenhagen, July 29.

MODERN CANDLE MAKERS. A unique special community service job was found by the Boy Scouts of Fredericton, N. B. In connection with celebration of the 150th anniversary of the city's selection as the capital of the province a huge outdoor "birthday cake" was constructed. The Scouts manufactured the 150 "candles".

MORE INTERNATIONAL SCOUT GATHERINGS. The Boy Scouts are never allowed to forget that they are an international brotherhood. With the great Australian Jamboree "and language" into history, they are now talking of Jamborees this summer in the United States, Denmark and Poland, and a World Rover Moot in Sweden.

CANADIAN SCOUTS TO U. S. JAMBOREE. Canada will be represented at the 25th Birthday Jamboree at the Boy Scouts of America, at Washington, August 21-30, by at least one composite Scout troop. The boys will go direct from their various provinces. The expected 30,000 Scouts will be reviewed by President Roosevelt. The P. E. I. Provincial Boy Scouts Association are endeavoring to have one First Class Scout to represent the Province.

SCOUTS WILL LIGHT KING'S JUBILEE BEACONS FROM ATLANTIC TO PACIFIC. Following announcement from Dominion Headquarters that the Scouts of Canada will celebrate the King's Silver Jubilee on the evening of May 8th, by lighting a chain of beacons from the Atlantic to the Pacific, Scout troops and district organizations are discussing and reporting plans for this display of loyalty. Wherever possible the lighting of the beacons will be preceded by a royal salute of 21 rockets. In the Old Country a similar chain of beacons will extend from John o' Groat's to Land's End.
