PARLOR CAR WANTED.

A parlor car to ply between Summerside and Charlottetown during the tourist season has been a long felt want that ought to be supplied for the coming summer. Tourists coming this way have sumptuous accommodations on the mainland railways; they will have this season ever more luxurious accommodation than before on the Steam Navigation Company's boats owing to the fine new steamer about to be put on the Summerside Point du Chene route and the railway equipment ought to be the best that can be had.

A parlor car is an even greater necessity on the Island Railway than on the Intercolonial, as owing to the exigencies of our narrow gauge road our passenger cars are small and the sittings cramped as compared with the spacious and well-appointed first-class passenger cars of the broad-gauge roads. Tourists in past years have complained a good deal on this score, and with good reason. "You seem not to have any parlor cars on this road," is a remark one often hears from our tourist visitors during the summer season.

The want should be supplied for the twofold reason that the traffic demands it and there is reason to believe it would prove a considerable source of revenue. Tourists as a rule want the best accommodation and most comfort they can get in travelling and are willing to pay for it. The extra charge for a parlor car would be cheerfully paid by a large proportion of such passengers, and this coach could take the place of one of the first-class cars, so as not in any way to add to the weight to be moved or the cost of moving it.

We trust the Superintendent, who has had his attention directed to this need in former years, will be able to see his way clear to have a parlor car constructed and put on the route during the coming summer. Tourist traffic is not heavy until July, and there is time in the interim to build a car of the desired class if it be promptly undertaken. All will see the importance of bringing our visitors through to their destination with every possible comfort, and that the Island Railway ought to keep abreast of the times in this matter and supply the best equipment possible for their comfort, as is done by other railways and the steamers which form connecting links.

It is intimated that His Honor the Lieutenant Governor in the speech with which he will open the Legislature today will promise measures for the extermination of weeds, for the consolidation of the statutes, for collecting vital statistics and for the protection of inshore fisheries and cultivation of oysters. Each of these subjects affords ground for useful legislation.

British rates on press telegrams are remarkably low, notably on special despatches. A correspondent can send one hundred words at night to seven different newspapers in seven different cities for fifty cents, or to thirteen different newspapers for seventy-five cents or to nineteen newspapers for a dollar. So says the Toronto World. For a like service in Prince Edward Island even under our present reduced rates the cost would be respectively over four, over five and nearly six times as much.

P. E. I. FISH AND GAME PROTECTION ASSOCIATION.

SIR—No progressive movement was yet made that did not meet with some obstacles or opposition. The movement for the preservation of the fish and game of the Province, commenced last fall by the Fish and Game Protection Association, is no exception to the rule.

As long as the Association was considered small and insignificant, (that was for the first three months of its existence) it met with no opposition. Like a delicate infant it was not expected to survive the perils of babyhood. But, after the first quarterly meeting when it was publicly announced that the objects of the Association were being generally endorsed and that numbers of people throughout the whole Island were voluntarily enrolling their names on the membership roll, then the opposition commenced.

Narrow minded and selfish disposed persons could not conceive that it was possible for others to be actuated by high minded patriotic motives. No body of men, they thought, would ever spend their time and money to benefit the country at large. They imagined there must be some hidden, sinister motive actuating the Association, and so oppose it in every possible manner.

The chief weapon used against the Association was misrepresentation. Every action on their part was misconstrued, and untruthful reports circulated throughout the Province.

To meet this opposition and to further the aims and objects of the Association, the executive officers sent their secretary to all the most important districts of the Province to hold public meetings to discuss the subject of fish and game protection, to explain fully the objects and aims of the Association, and to collect the wishes and suggestions of the people as to what amendments of the fishery and game laws would prove beneficial to the Province as a whole.

The quickest way to kill a falsehood is to lay the truth alongside of it. This proved to be the case with regard to the misrepresentations concerning the Association that had been scattered broadcast throughout the Province. Opposition faded away before the clear and convincing explanations given. Numbers united with the Association. Votes of confidence in, and of sympathy with the Association and its aims and objects were passed by those previously opposed.

At the meetings held the people pronounced the wishes and requirements of their district. On the return of the secretary the executive of the Association spent a great deal of time and infinite pains in collating and reducing to a homogeneous whole these suggestions and wishes of the people concerning the protection of fish and game. A draft of a bill embodying the suggestions regarding game was carefully prepared. It was endorsed at the quarterly meeting held March 2nd at which the three counties were well represented, and it has been presented to the Lieut-Governor-in-Council who will lay it before the Legislature at the present session.

Owing to the feeling of opposition already referred to, some local clubs have been formed, in the vicinity of Charlottetown; but their aims being decidedly local and narrow are not in sympathy with the P. E. I. Fish and Game Protection Association; nor could they be recognized by the Association until such time as their constitutions and bye laws had been submitted and approved of.

The Association membership embraces approximately 300, the great majority of whom reside in the country districts, and are heartily in sympathy with its objects. It is greatly to be desired that the Local Legislature will adopt the Game Act to be submitted, as the Legislature should be the guardian of this, one of the Province's best assets. Out of deference to the wishes of the people, the gun license has been dropped, except for non-residents; at the same time how can a law be enforced without means to do it with? There is an old saying that "those who dance must pay the piper" so those who pursue game should

bear the expense of protecting it. It would be manifestly unfair to spend taxes collected for educational purposes, roads and bridges and other services in protecting the game for the sport and pleasure of the few.

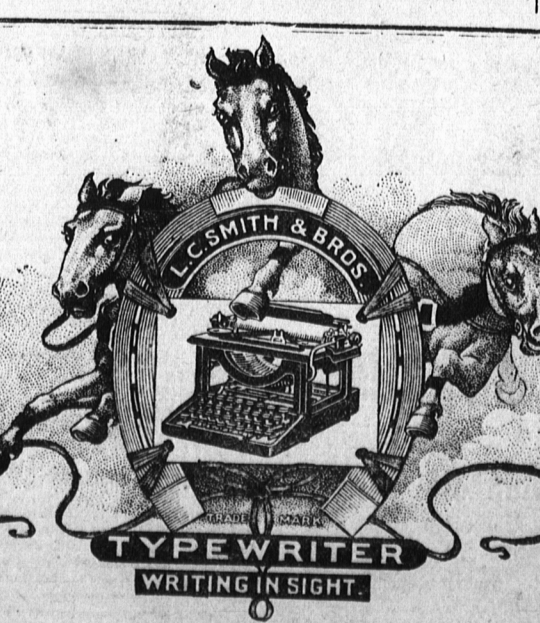
