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France Extends Its Friendship To Germany

(Canadian Press Cable)
LAUSANNE, Switzerland, July 12.—France offered the handclasp of friendship to Germany in the session of the Lausanne Conference today which adopted the convention dropping the reparations burden.

"Asking the powers to create the 'spirit of Lausanne,' Premier Edouard Herriot turned and pointed to the German delegation and added: 'The French have listened with attention to the story of the sufferings of the German people, with whom we would like to establish friendly relations.'

"The Frenchman who is speaking to you desires that we be united in common thought in those words of peace on earth, goodwill towards men."

Chancellor Franz Von Papen, of Germany replied, proclaiming reparations a dead issue.

Neville Chamberlain, Chancellor of the British Exchequer, said Great Britain was proud to be associated in the work which should bring profound results, while Dino Braschi, Italian Foreign Minister,

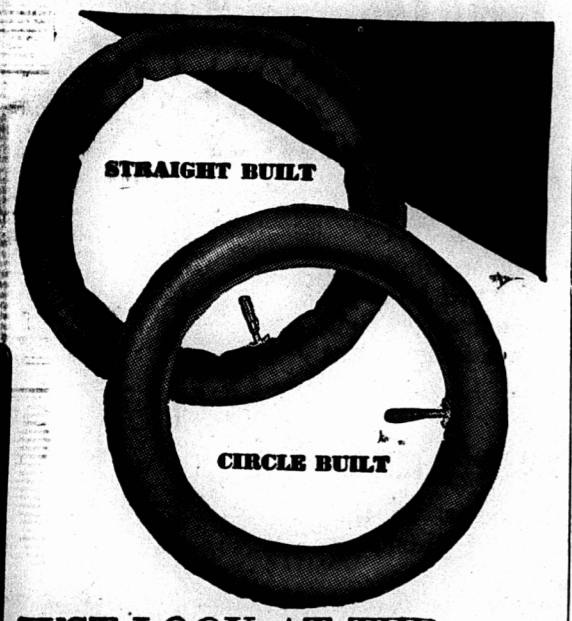
Grass-Hoppers At Grand Pre

AVONPORT, N. S., July 12.—The rich dykelands of Grand Pre, scene of the historic expulsion of the French Acadians in 1755, have fallen prey to an invasion of grass-hoppers. Myriads of these insects have settled down over the march hayfields and threatening the oat crops on the higher levels.

Farmers hastening to harvest their hay before it is ruined by the pests, have removed the danger from that quarter only to see it settle in the outfields. Unless their ravages were halted it was estimated they would destroy the entire oat crop in a week.

Dr. W. S. Blair, Superintendent of the Dominion Experimental Farm at Kentville, has been making experiments with varieties of poison, and an alternative suggestion had been the importation of several carloads of turkeys to fight the grasshoppers.

It is expected that after the harvest the dykes will be opened and the meadows flooded to guard against a recurrence of the plague.

Fire Threatens Waterfront
BOSTON, July 12.—Fire threatened the Boston waterfront, in the Charlottetown district, this afternoon, but apparatus from all downtown and Charlottetown stations, cooperating with two fire boats and five tugs, checked the wind-driven flames. The damage was \$10,000.

The fire damaged a huge freight warehouse, 500-feet long and 100-feet wide, owned by the Boston and Maine railroad and occupied by the Allen Steamship Company. The warehouse covered slips 48, 49 and 50 of the Mystic Docks and contained, among other things, wood pulp and potash.

Anxiety Removed Curlew Is Found
NEW LONDON, Conn., July 12.—The Ketch Curlew, missing since she entered the Montauk-to-Bermuda race eight days ago was found safe tonight off Davis South Shoal by the U. S. Coast Guard Patrol Boat Marion from the local base.

N. B. Will Have Average Crop

FREDERICTON, N.B., July 12.—A week of exceptionally heavy rain a repetition of preceding conditions this summer, wound up in the Central Saint John Valley on Saturday night with heavy showers, the most severe in Fredericton and vicinity occurring around 7.30 o'clock. The rain fall amounted to 37 inches, and the total from Sunday morning to the end of the week was 89 inches.

It is estimated unofficially that the New Brunswick hay crop will be an average one of around three quarters of a million tons, slightly under the big yields of the past two seasons.

The hay is ripening rapidly and has about reached the stage where cutting may be undertaken.
