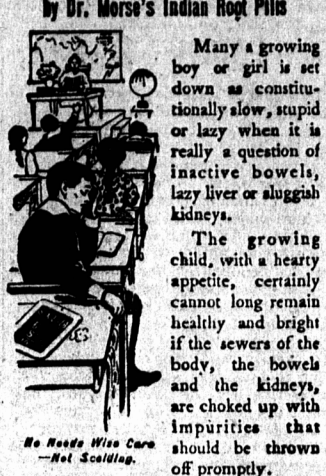

FRIDAY. Another ideal day favored the Exhibition Association and another record crowd were in attendance. The birdman made two successful flights, one at two o'clock and the other at four. In the last flight he ascended 5,000 feet. The other attractions were splendid and their many stunts amazed those present. A continuous crowd of interested spectators viewed the Martin Hay Tedder yesterday as it was being demonstrated in Machinery Building, and numerous were the compliments that were paid the builders, Bruce Stewart & Co., as well as complimentary glances for the benefit of the inventor who was present to demonstrate the machine. Mr. Martin states that a large number of farmers urged that the Hay Tedder attachment be put on the market for next season. Peter Robertson, one of the progressive farmers of Marshfield, P. E. I., and Paul Doyle, of Jacquet River, N. B., who farms on a large scale there, are among the many who are keen to avail themselves of the advent of the new machine. The first race called was the 2.17 trot and pace, in which there were four starters. Hilda S., Devilish Dorothy, Ginger and Zenot. Hilda S. regained her reputation by winning the race in three straight heats, going two of them in 2:20. Dorothy was fouled in the second heat and her driver was thrown from the sulky, but escaped serious injuries. Every heat was well contested and excitement did not lack until the race was finished.

The second race on the program was the 2.35 Trot and 2.38 Pace. There were four starters, Iona Girl, Telephone G., Cherry Ripe, and Chahallis Jr. Iona Girl was picked to win but Cherry deceived the "wise ones," and won the race in splendid form by capturing the second, third, and fourth heats. In the first heat Iona Girl drew the pole and was not headed to the wire. On the first turn Cherry went to a break and his driver drove easy to save distance. The second heat saw Iona Girl take one of her Kangaroo jumps and become unmanageable and ran to the wire. Cherry nosed out Chahallis Jr. with Telephone G. third. The third heat was the best finish of the meet between Chahallis Jr. and Cherry for first position. Cherry proved himself the strongest finisher and the Moncton entry had to be content with second position. The driver of Iona Girl did all he could to win the heat, but she appeared to be weakening and would not try to make one of her lightning finishes, as she has been doing all the season. The fourth heat proved a good one. On the first turn Cherry went to a break and Iona took the lead and gained many lengths. From the spectators' point of view the heat was Iona's but when Cherry caught, he made up his lost ground quicker time than it takes to tell it. When the three-quarter mark was reached, Cherry was trailing Iona and easily outfooted her on the stretch winning the heat and first money, amid deafening applause. Iona second and second money, Telephone G. third and fourth money, Chahallis Jr. fourth third money. In this heat Chahallis Jr. took the "thumps" and he jogged around. P. S. Brown drove the Moncton horse and deserves praise for the creditable manner in which he handled the ribbons. It must be remembered that Cherry Ripe and Chahallis Jr. went a four-heat race on the previous day which makes Cherry's win all the more glorious. At the Halifax meet Cherry was raced without hobbles, which partly accounts for his poor showing as he broke repeatedly. The three-year-old Trot and Pace proved a fizzle. Baron Cecil outclassed all his competitors and distanced Rexlight and Acquired in the first heat. In the race-off between those two for third money Rexlight won in 3:31, one minute and three seconds slower than the heat time made by the winners. The heat was a joke and made fun for the spectators as Rexlight only nosed Acquired out at the wire. Telephone G. trained and driven by J. A. Henderson, proved himself a race horse by winning fourth money and finishing with the other pacer in 2:21. Much credit is due Mr. Henderson for the vast improvement he made in this pretty pacer during the short time he has been under his care. A GOOD RECORD. That capable horse trainer J. P. Irving, Cape Breton, made a splendid record by training and driving four entries to win four firsts in the two days' meet. It is regrettable that Baby Logan should take sick and was unable to start in the 2.17 trot and pace.
