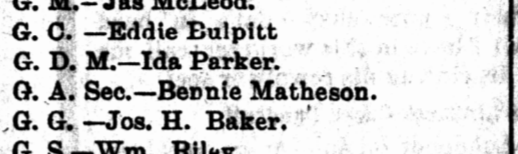
THE Grand Division of the Independent Order of Good Templars met yesterday with Albion Lodge Dundas in the Baptist church. The election of officers resulted as follows:

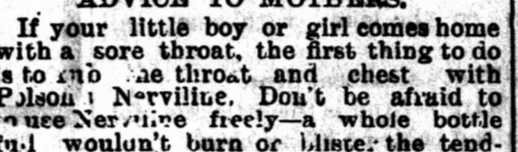

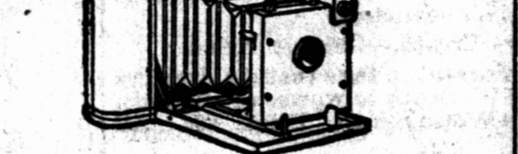
