**DOMINION INCOME WAR TAX ACT**  
TO WHOM APPLICABLE.

Every person who in 1918 resided or ordinarily resided in Canada or was employed in Canada or carried on business in Canada, including operations and joint stock companies.

**WHO SHOULD FILE RETURNS.**

1. Every unmarried person or widow or widower, without dependent children under twenty-one years of age, who during calendar year 1918 received or earned \$1,000 or more.
2. All other individuals who during calendar year 1918 received or earned \$2,000 or more.
3. Every corporation and joint stock company whose profits exceeded \$3,000, during the fiscal year ended in 1918.

**FORMS TO BE FILLED IN AND FILED.**

FORM T1. By individuals, other than farmers and ranchers.  
FORM T1A. By farmers and ranchers.  
FORM T2. By corporations and joint stock companies.  
FORM T3. By trustees, executors, administrators of estates and assignees.  
FORM T4. By employers to make return of the names of all directors, officials, agents or other employees to whom was paid \$1,000 or more in salaries, bonuses, commission or other remuneration during the calendar year 1918.  
FORM T5. By corporations, joint stock companies, associations and syndicates to make return of all dividends and bonuses paid to shareholders and members during 1918. Individuals comprising partnerships must file returns in their individual capacity.

**GENERAL INFORMATION**

All returns must be filed IN DUPLICATE.  
Forms may be obtained from the Inspectors and Assistant Inspectors of Taxation and from the Postmasters at all leading centres.  
Returns should be filed immediately.  
Postage must be prepaid on letters and other documents forwarded by mail to Inspectors of Taxation.

He was killed in action at Sain le Marquon, 11 1/2 miles South of Douai on September 27th last. No details however are available as to his death. Pte. Kane was a member of the famous 16th Canadian Battalion. His burial place is officially described as Plot 1, Row D, Grove No. 14, and its marking is a temporary wooden memorial erected with all particulars of deceased engraved thereon. Another brother was severely wounded and he is now in a convalescent home in Montreal.

**CAR LOAD OF HORSES.**—Mr. D. M. McDonald shipped a car load of horses yesterday, among them a pair purchased from Mr. T. H. Simmons of Royalty, weighing 3320 pounds. This was pronounced by expert horsemen one of the finest pairs of draft horses ever shipped from the Province. The price paid for the pair was necessarily a big one.

**NEW METAL FACTORY AT HALIFAX.**—The Canada Metal Co. Ltd. of Toronto are building a \$50,000 factory in Halifax consisting of a rolling mill to make sheet lead and a hydraulic machine to make lead pipe, and a brass foundry. This was brought about by the new ship yards coming to Halifax which will no doubt bring a lot of other factories there also. This company recently shipped from Toronto to Halifax nine carloads of cement laundry tubs making a total of 700 tubs. Halifax is growing rapidly and if they will build asphalt streets same as Victoria B. C., Halifax will be one of the show places in Canada in a short while.

**HERO REMEMBERED.**—Among the lads who returned recently to his Island home was D. M. Clark (better known as Don) son of Mr. and Mrs. Dobson Clark, Muddy Creek, P. E. I. He enlisted the first part of February 1917 and went overseas in July and to France in November, 1917. He served nine months in the trenches and saw a lot of heavy fighting. He fought in the battle at Amiens and was wounded at Arras August, 27th, 1918, in the shoulder with nine other flesh wounds. After spending some months in hospital he arrived home January 27th, 1919. A reception was held in the Union Corner Hall for him and after speeches by some of the leading gentlemen of the community and vocal and instrumental music by some of the ladies, Don was presented with a signet ring and a purse of money. Mr. and Mrs. Clark have another boy, Earl, in Germany, who has also done his bit.

Stewart, when a rousing reception was tendered, by them to their son Arthur and his bride who was formerly Miss Pearl W. Howatt, Borden at which place they were united in marriage on the twenty eight ult. A large number of invited guests were present and a sumptuous repast ably served and heartily partaken of by all. Loud reports heralded the arrival of an army of merry serenaders who, under command of one of Mr. Stewart's most famous generals, very creditably performed the customary manoeuvres. The remainder of the evening was pleasantly and profitably spent—music and various other amusements making the time speed only too rapidly. So upon the arrival of the wee small hours and after many good wishes and congratulations to the happy young couple and the genial host and hostess and the singing of the National Anthem, all departed joyously to their homes.

Major Sir Andrew MacPhail, Eldon, Prince Edward Island, was one of the arrivals at Halifax on Saturday, a passenger on board the S. S. Lapland. 


