To Kill Cattle At Abattoir In Summerside

It was learned last night that official permission had been obtained to slaughter cattle at the Town Abattoir, Summerside, for packing purposes during the present meat packers' strike. The cannery will be done in the plant of Messrs Jenks Bros.

Some days ago application by this firm was made through the Department of Agriculture, Animal Health Division, Ottawa. On Tuesday Dr. Landy, Maritime supervisor of the Department stationed at Moncton arrived in Summerside to look into conditions at the Abattoir. Accompanied by H.S. Worship Mayor J.F. Arnett, C. O. G. Clow and members of the firm of Jenks Bros., Dr. Landy inspected the Abattoir and gave his official okay for temporary operation.

A great deal of credit is due to Mr. J.W. MacNaughton for the quick action taken as the result of cutting industry will provide a market for farmers' cattle and employment for the employees of the firm of Jenks Bros. who would be otherwise idle as this is an in-between season at the plant. It is understood that the Abattoir will be able to handle about 15 head of cattle daily.

Glace Bay Potato Picker Injured At Middleton

Frank Hutton, aged 19, of Glace Bay, N.S., employed by Cecil McCabe, Middleton, as potato picker, met with a serious accident on Tuesday night in which his right arm was badly mangled. He also sustained multiple fractures of his left arm. The injured man was driving on horseback, trailing behind a car driven by Mr. McCabe. They were proceeding slowly. As a truck coming in the opposite direction, driven by Harold Williams, Ellerslie, passed the car driven by Mr. McCabe, the horse came between the two vehicles and became unmanageable. Hutton was thrown to the ground and in falling his arm apparently caught in the truck box supports inflicting the injury.
