OBITUARY. The angel of Death has again visited Cornwall and claimed for its victim Cyril Pye, dearly beloved son of Frank and Mrs. Howard. He was enjoying his usual good health until within three days of his demise, but in spite of all that loving care could do, death claimed him for his own, and he passed peacefully away on the morning of the 21st, of September, at the age of fifteen years. Deceased was of a kind and loving disposition, and was a general favorite in the neighborhood. He will be greatly missed, not only in the home but also in the Sunday School, which he so regularly attended. The respect and esteem in which he was held was shown by the large circle of relatives and friends that gathered to say farewell, there being over one hundred carriages in the funeral procession. The services at the house and grave were conducted by his pastor, the Rev. Hugh Miller assisted by the Rev. William Harrison. The remains were laid to rest in Cornwall Cemetery there to await the morn when they cometh to make up his jewels. The pall-bearers were—Purdy Scott, Willie Carson, Hilbert Fritzie, Daniel Macarthur, Frank Lowther, and Fulton Moreside. He leaves to mourn besides his sorrowing parents, one sister Mary and two brothers, Hazen and Victor. The sympathy of all is extended to the bereaved ones in this their hour of sorrow.

Neighbors, seeing the flames light just in time to rescue the old people. The barn, however, was a mass of fire, hurried to the house flames and unapproachable.
