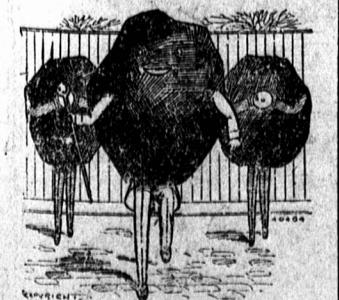

EDITORS FOUGHT DUEL IN HAVANA

HAVANA, May 2.—Dr. Carlos Garrido, editor of La Prensa, and Antonio Irazos, editor of La Noche, fought a duel with swords in Havana yesterday morning. Senor Irazos was seriously wounded in the chest. The dispute which led to this encounter arose from the points of view maintained by these two newspapers concerning the trial of Brueso Asbert, former Governor of the Province of Havana for the murder of Chief of Police Armando Riva in 1912. The two editors engaged in a heated dispute, which was followed by a recourse to arms. The trial of Asbert is now progressing. La Prensa has been bitterly reproaching friends of Asbert for their attitude toward the court and their doubts as to the court's impartiality, while La Noche has been strongly in favor of the case of the ex-Governor.
