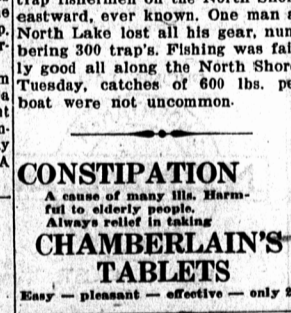

PROPERTY SOLD.—Dr. Alexander Ross has sold his residence on Prince Street to Dr. Heath McIntyre, of this city. Dr. McIntyre is to be congratulated on having secured one of the most valuable residential properties in the city. Dr. Ross finds the winter climate especially trying since his return from England and contemplates taking some months off during the summer, probably in British Columbia and, if he finds that climate more suitable he may reside there.

ICE STILL LINGERS.—The ice is still floating, but well outside in the Gulf, along the North Shore. A large body of ice, stretching to East-Point, could be seen from shore, its inner edge on about 30 fathoms of water on Tuesday and Wednesday. Inside to the shore the water is free of ice. I.e. where the lobster traps are set. A large number of whole sets of traps were carried away by the ice Friday and Saturday. Two fishermen at Black Bush, lost 400 or about one-third of their traps. Farther East the destruction to the fishing gear was much worse, it fact all along the Eastern Coast on the North Side, more or less traps and rope were carried away. It is said one factory, East, had lost so much of its gear they think about closing down. The loss is very great, and must necessarily limit the season's output, whatever way things go. This is probably the worst year for the trap fishermen on the North Shore eastward, ever known. One man at North Lake lost all his gear, numbering 300 traps. Fishing was fairly good all along the North Shore Tuesday, catches of 600 lbs. per boat were not uncommon.
