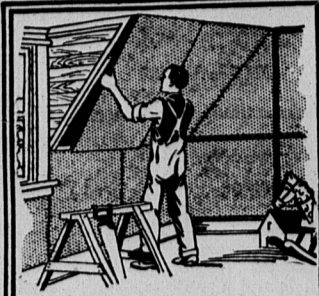

Butter Production Shows An Increase

HALIFAX, Aug. 27.—(By The Canadian Press) — Production of creamery butter in Nova Scotia continues to increase, according to figures supplied by Hon. O. P. Goucher, Minister of Agriculture.

Estimated production of creamery butter in this Province for July amounted to 842,879 pounds, compared with 749,088 pounds during the same month last year. This represents an increase of 12 per cent.
