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UNVEILING SOLDIERS MEMORIAL AT HARTSVILLE
A most impressive and beautiful ceremony took place at Hartsville on Tuesday, July 5th, at three o'clock p. m., the occasion being the unveiling of the monument erected there by the people of the congregation, in honour of the men from the vicinity who fought and died in the great war for civilization.

This beautiful monument of black granite, stands over sixteen feet high, surrounded by a mound sixteen feet square and thirty inches high. On the shaft are inscribed the words: "Erected by a people's love, to the memory of our heroic dead." On the die are the names of those who gave up their lives for King and country, and below, the words: "At the going down of the sun and in the morning, we shall remember them."

The names of those who returned are still to be inscribed. This memorial, the cost of which has already been over-subscribed, will stand for generations to come as evidence of the people's appreciation of the sacrifice of their boys who died, and who were willing to die, in the cause of freedom and justice.

The service was largely attended, many being present from Charlottetown, and other districts. The speakers of the occasion were Rev. R. H. Stavert, pastor of the congregation, Rev. (Major) G. C. Taylor, of Zion Church, Charlottetown, Rev. D. M. Matheson, of Stellarton, N. S.; Rev. John Stirling, Bradalton and Mr. J. Sydney Bonnell, Cavendish.

Rev. Mr. Stavert had as his subject, the quotation "If we break faintly, committing our obligations into unbinding, the principles for which the boys fought." The address by Rev. Mr. Taylor was listened to with rapt attention, his subject being "The cost of our nationhood."

Beginning with the second battle of Ypres, he described the struggles and hardships and undaunted courage of the Canadian Corps, all through the subsequent engagements, to Mons, victory and peace, his word-picture of conditions and achievements being most vivid, and showing clearly the great part played by Canada's sons in the war, and the dreadful cost of it, all in blood, and sorrow, and death.

He also spoke in praise of the large number recruited from this section, few, if any, rural districts having sent so many men, in proportion to population. "We shall remember them," was beautifully delivered by Mr. J. Sydney Bonnell.

The addresses by Rev. Mr. Matheson and Rev. Mr. Stirling were brief, and emphasized the fact that the armistice did not end the fight for the principles, but that we have still to combat the same forces of evil and wrong doing in the life of our Dominion.

The singing throughout was excellent, the Offertory hymn, "Some time we'll understand," being particularly well-rendered and appropriate and much credit is due the organist, Miss McKenzie, for her untiring efforts in organizing this part of the programme.

Solos by Mr. Sandy MacGregor and Mr. Geo. Beers, were excellently rendered. The unveiling of the monument was doubtless the most impressive part of the service. Grouped about the mound, facing inward with bared heads, stood some fifteen veterans; the large audience also standing, uncovered; and as the soul-stirring notes of the "Last Post," sounded by Bugler Hynes, the boys, sleeping, until awakened by the last Grand Reveille.
