In Memoriam

In the death of James M. Duff, Kinkora loses one of its oldest inhabitants. He has already passed 83 years and lived all his life in the community and on the farm where he was born. He was one of the strong men of the last generation and was foremost in every movement making for the good of the community. By hard work and prudent thrift he set an example well worth following. For over 40 years he was trustee of Kinkora Church and assisted in building the fine parochial house and church which now adorn this parish.

His death although not unexpected came suddenly and quietly in the end. He had visited all his family in their respective residences and came to Charlottetown for treatment only a week before his death. Fortified by the last rites of Mother Church he passed away quietly in his sleep about noon on Monday, September 2nd.

His remains were taken to Kinkora and buried in the family plot there beside those of his wife who predeceased him four years ago. The funeral was very largely attended by people from all the surrounding country and from Charlottetown.

The funeral Mass was celebrated by Rev. Matthias M. Smith, who also performed the services at the grave, assisted by Rev. Peter S. Duffy, nephew of deceased, and by Rev. Thomas Curran.

The pall bearers were John Trainor, James Greenan, Patrick McCarroll, Roderick Nicholson, Patrick J. Smith and Patrick Creighton.

All his family, with one exception, survive. They are as follows: C. Gavan Duffy, K.C., Charlottetown; Emmett A. Duffy, at home; Bennett P. Duffy of Vancouver; Mrs. Mary D. Hammill, wife of Thomas Hammill of Beauce; Mrs. Annie E. McCardle, wife of James McCardle of Kinkora and M. Elizabeth Callaghan, wife of Patrick J. Callaghan of North Wiltshire.

A large number of wreaths and spiritual offerings were presented by the family and friends of the deceased. Truly a faithful and good man has gone to his reward.

RAILWAY PROGRESS STEADILY INCREASES

(Special to The Guardian)

TORONTO, Ont., Sept. 10.—The personnel of the Canadian National Railways is as good as any in the world, and they are living up to expectations, said C. E. Brooks, chief of motive power, Canadian National Railways, inventor of the new oil electric locomotive number 9,000, before a crowd at the directors' luncheon at the Canadian National Exhibition today.

He spoke on behalf of the Canadian National Railways at Transportation, Aviation and Commercial Travellers' Day and made the statement in refuting those who charged that the railways were falling to keep pace with progress. Pointing out that the railways here were forced with a tremendous mileage which imposed severe weight restrictions, he went on to show how the engine had met their difficulties, mentioning particularly the use of nickel as an alloy of steel. Mr. V. R. Jacobs, aeronautical manager for Goodyear Tire spoke on the future possibilities of lighter than air transportation, referring to the tremendous envelopes now under construction. Officials of both railways, of the Commercial Travellers' Association, Mayor McBride, Premier Ferguson and Brig.-Gen. J. H. McBrien, were among those at the head table.

CENTRAL VERMONT RAILWAY

(Canadian Press)

MONTREAL, Sept. 11.—The C. N. R. Headquarters here today issued the following official statement: application has been presented at Washington before the United States Commerce Commission, by the Central Vermont Railway Inc., for authority to take over the business in the Central Vermont Railway Company and operate it and its subsidiary lines in the States of Vermont, Massachusetts, Connecticut and New York as well as the lines in the province of Quebec, connecting with the C. N. R. The application also asks authority to issue to the extent of twelve million dollars first mortgage bonds, debentures to the extent of five million and ten million dollars in common stock further the Canadian National Railways presents an application for permission to own all the stock and securities of the Central Vermont Railway Inc.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 11.—The Senate today formally ordered an investigation of activities of United States shipbuilding corporations at the unsuccessful 1927 Geneva naval limitations conference. Without a dissenting vote it adopted the Borah resolution to authorize the inquiry. There was but little debate on the proposal. The naval committee will meet tomorrow to begin the investigation.

Senator McKellar, Democrat, Tennessee, suggested that the investigation include a study of "propaganda on the other side of the naval question," but Senator Robinson of Kansas, the Democratic leader, insisted that the inquiry be directed at this particular question which is separate and distinct from propaganda and which involves interference in what

is essentially the foreign relations of the United States.
